4.) Judas used a concern for the poor to judge the actions of Mary. However, we know that it wasn't the poor who he was most concerned about. Do you ever find yourself using a "concern for others" to benefit yourself?

7.) Does a person have to experience something big like a brother (Lazarus) being brought back to life to have an extravagant kind of love?

8.) Both Mary and Judas sat under the same teaching of Jesus. Why do you think one of them became more devoted to Jesus while the other became more devoted to self?

9.) What is the most extravagant thing that you have done on behalf of another person?
