Looking in the Rearview Mirror (While Driving Forward)

"How did it feel to write your life story?" some people ask me. "How did you get so much done?" "I don't know," I answer. "I guess I had more energy then."

At Carolyn's request, I'm pondering the experience of writing my memoirs. Since I gathered many details for the book from my letters home to my parents, one of my main feelings was surprise. I was surprised to discover how many things in the letters I'd forgottenmajor things that impacted my life. That makes me wonder how many things all of us forget in our lives and whether we will have full memory in heaven. Well, maybe not, since there are not going to be any tears in heaven. Those of you who journal or blog have a record, but I didn't have time for that. I was also surprised at the strength God gave when situations seemed unending or impossible. You might also be surprised at the things I had to leave out, but I imagine that those of you who read the book were glad it wasn't any longer.

I was not surprised, however, at the times I didn't get it right. Those I remember painfully well. It was a little hard to write about them, but I was glad to assure readers of God's forgiveness and love that I experienced. Some readers have thanked me for being honest, and I know for myself that the books that have been most influential in my life have been those where I could identify with the characters as an ordinary human being. Africa missionaries, especially, have thanked me for the ways in which they could identify with the people, places and experiences that the book brought to mind--and that makes me glad.

Perhaps the most important result of writing the book has been the ability for me to see the big picture. In the classes I taught on missionary life and



work, I felt it was always important to prepare students to take the long view. They would be learning much, working hard and planting seeds and there would not be much to show for it for a while—maybe not even for a long time. I enjoyed telling them stories of times I felt inadequate and the results that God brought later on. But I was not quite prepared for the experience of looking back over my whole life and realizing how faithful God had been. Early in the story I developed a strong conviction about prayer. God's fantastic promises about prayer in the Bible must mean something, so I tried to take him at his word. He taught me much about how to pray and how to trust. Many prayers were answered over time. How encouraging it was to notice them! Other prayers were not answered in the way I had hoped and there are still unanswered questions about a life of prayer, but the unfailing conviction that grows stronger each day I live is that God is absolutely faithful!

This leads to an overwhelming sense of gratefulness. Does it make sense to be thankful for a thankful heart? I know. Who wouldn't be *Continued on Page 2*



thankful for what I have been given and what I have experienced? Still, it is so easy to focus on the things that go wrong instead of the things that go right! Writing the book has reinforced that for me and God is helping me not to focus on the things that seem to go wrong.

And best of all, it's not over. At the end of the book I tried to kind of bring things to a conclusion and enlarge on the fact that I'm now an old lady, but it didn't work very well. I still felt like looking forward. Recently someone said to me that they



thought I looked 60 years old. Wasn't that a diplomatic thing to say? I wonder what they really thought. It may be that my biggest challenges are still to come as an older person, but in the meantime I want to practice being thankful, joyful, expectant, faithful, forgiving and loving.

# Leadership Council Report By Steven Miller

Much of our January meeting was spent discussing the annual Congregational Council held in February. As per last year's council meeting decision on how to allocate excess funds from the previous year, Leadership Council made plans for Ministry Council and Properties and Facilities to nominate projects for a "Priority List" to be brought before the council meeting. LC continued discussion on who to nominate for two remaining open elder seats on Leadership Council. Leadership Council also:

- Heard from Pastor John about DBIC's historical attendance rates, noting a 6 percent increase in 2016.
- Discussed the transition of Phil Engle taking the lead on the Properties & Facilities team and Gary Lebo taking the lead on the Capital Campaign team.
- Approved edits to DBIC's Personnel Manual for mileage reimbursement recording and submission.
- Discussed the various holdover funds on the balance sheet, as well as the 2016 net operating income.
- Heard from Avis Whitesel that the transition team has Pastor Rob Douglass scheduled to join DBIC leadership for a spring retreat on April 1.

# Stop Traffic By Marj Strayer

I want to pass on a HUGE THANK YOU from Peace Promise. Thank you all for participating in the Eat for Freedom. Dillsburg has really played a large role in supporting Peace Promise as they reach out to those who are trapped in the adult entertainment industry, both the legal and illegal side of it.

From Dillsburg BIC, we have nine people who are actively involved in an ongoing way in this ministry. Added to that there are many, many more of you who participate in the fundraising events as they come up. We are doing our part in combatting both human sex trafficking and an industry that preys upon some of the most vulnerable. Way to go, Dillsburg!

The following are the preliminary figures just in from Peace Promise on the money raised from the two Eat for Freedom events. Altogether from Hoss's Restaurant (\$908), spaghetti dinner ticket pre-sales, bake sale, Change Purse sales and sponsorships (5K), they raised \$16,326.98. Their net income after expenses was \$13,760.52. Donations are still coming in. We were all very pleased.

#### Born and raised in . . . .

As mentioned above, most of my days in the last 4.5 years have been spent helping to care for my parents, so they could remain in their home, as they've walked the journey and battle of my mom's cancer.

#### How I became a Christian .....

I am not sure exactly how or when I became a believer in Jesus. I grew up attending Lewisberry United

Methodist Church as a child, teenager, and God planted the seeds of faith through His Word in my life at that time. I have always believed those truths, but spent many years not fully embracing them or living them out. From 1993 through 1997, I had the privilege of living in the Rocky Mountains of Colorado, and became part of a vibrant, Bible-preaching church, and God helped bring to fruition, the truths of His Word that had been planted early in my life. I was baptized in 1998 and am so grateful that He gave me the gift of grace and faith to turn and believe and embrace Jesus in a more complete way.

#### A time I really saw God work in my life was . . .

I would have to say again, the four years I spent in the beautiful Rocky Mountains of northwest Colorado, were a very special time of the Lord drawing me to Himself, through the breathtaking majesty of Creation, the community of believers there, and beginning to understand the work of the Holy spirit in my life in a real and vibrant way.
