What do you want?

I have been assisting in my daughter's preschool this fall, helping fill a vacancy in the teaching roster. The beginning of the school year can be a wild ride, especially as the three-year-olds adjust to new routines and rules, and on several occasions I have held on tight to children who are overwhelmed or out-of-control. As I sat one day with a small boy who kept running away from the class, I asked him, "What do you want?" He looked up at me and quickly said, "I want to go home."

I doubt that my young friend is the only homesick soul among us. We all desire places that feel like home: to be safe, to be known, to be whole. The gospels of Mark and Luke record the story of a blind man named Bartimaeus, who spends his days begging by the side of a road near Jericho. Clearly Bartimaeus has heard about Jesus' power to heal, because when he is told that Jesus of Nazareth is passing by, he brazenly begins to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" The crowds attempt to hush him, but Bartimaeus shouts even louder. Jesus calls him over and asks, "What do you want me to do for you?"

At first glance this question appears to have an obvious answer. The man is blind, so of course he wants his sight, right? But Jesus is the master of questions, and his interactions with people are always significant. In both gospel accounts, the stories that lead up to this interaction are stories where Jesus explains how to enter the kingdom of God. Jesus tells his disciples that the kingdom of God belongs to those who are willing to receive it like a little child, to those who are willing to sacrifice, and to those who are willing to serve. In Mark's account, Jesus has just finished asking this

same question ("What do you want me to do for you?") to two of his own disciples, James and John. The brothers approach Jesus and request to be seated at his right and left side. Jesus tells them, "You don't know what you are asking," and he explains that those places of honor are not for him to grant.

When Bartimaeus hears Jesus' question, he asks for the deepest desire of his heart: "Lord, I want to see!" Yet the irony of the story is that blind Bartimaeus can already see Jesus more clearly than the disciples can. He implicitly understands something about the kingdom of God and what Jesus has to offer him. Unlike the disciples, who are seeking honor, Bartimaeus is begging for mercy. His request comes from a place of humility—a place of desperate need rather than entitlement. And his request comes from a place of confidence—a place of expectancy and child-like faith.

That day in preschool, I could not grant my young friend's request. I could not take him home right away, but I could (and did) promise him that I would stay with him until it was time to go home. I believe that often Jesus' answer to us is a promise of presence: "I am with you," he says. Yet I also believe that Jesus has the ability to do more than we can ask or imagine, and when we come before him as Bartimaeus did—with humility of heart and with confidence in his power—he is deeply honored.

The story of Bartimaeus makes me wonder... What would I say if Jesus asked me, "What do you want me to do for you?" What do I want? What do you

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want? Do we have the courage, humility and faith to ask Jesus for what we want? As I have imagined myself in Bartimaeus' place, the words of the blind man keep bubbling up in my heart: "Lord, I want to see!" I want to see Jesus and the true nature of the kingdom of God. I want to see others in the light of his mercy and love. And I want to see myself as Jesus sees me: as a beloved child and friend.

May it be so!

In The Pew Next To You...

Born & raised in . . . Watsontown, Pa.

A bit about family. . . I have two daughters, Andrea, age 33 and Erica, age 31. Andrea is married to her high school sweetheart, Nick. They have four children: Spencer, 9, Stella, 6, Scarlett, 3 and Slade, 6 mos. and live in North Carolina. Erica has a home in Dillsburg she shares with two chihuahuas. She is a corrections officer at Cumberland County Prison. My mother lives in Delaware. She suffers from early dementia. My father and brother are deceased. When I was 14, we moved to a "gentlemen's" farm, meaning we had lots of chores—farm animals, a large garden and lots of mowing but the land was farmed by someone else. My brother and I spent an entire summer painting a barn and outbuildings! We did fun things too like camping and traveling to a new state each year. By the time I was 12, we have traveled to every state on the eastern coast, Canada and to South Dakota. My aunts and uncles live in Maryland, Virginia and northern Pa. so I don't see everyone as often as I would like.

I spend my days doing. . . . I work for the Commonwealth full time. I moved into a 1903 home, so I am usually working on new projects to give it a new life and improve its appearance. There is always something to do (or fix). I have two rescued dogs and a cat. They also make sure I have something to do! I recently joined a wonderful prayer group at DBIC. I also work part-time at a restaurant and do a small amount of selling antique and vintage pieces on Ebay.

How I became a Christian . . . In Watsontown, there is a church on almost every corner. My grandmother lived in town and I stayed with her whenever I had a chance. Sundays we would walk to Sunday school and church at the United Church of Christ. My family also attended, but not every Sunday like my grandmother. So I would say she started the foundation of learning about God and what it is to be a Christian.

A time I really saw God work in my life was . . . So many times, but when I was 16, my dad had an old Thunderbird and I took the car out on a foggy night to run an errand. I stopped at the intersection of Rt. 44 and Rt. 15 in Allenwood and the car stalled and drifted into the center of the road. Rt. 15 has a lot of heavy tractor trailer traffic and sure enough, there was a truck coming down the hill. I didn't have time to get out of the car, but all of a sudden someone was knocking on the window (the truck driver had stopped). He pushed my car across the intersection to the gas station next door, out of harm's way. It was a time when I knew God was looking out for me.

My biggest passion is . . . To never forget about the sacrifices of our veterans. Service men and women from the past, present and future protect our freedoms to believe in God and keep our homeland safe. I think sometimes people are in such a hurry and take for granted our veterans. My uncle was in WWII in an army unit called Merrill's Marauders in Burma. Out of nearly 3,000 men who volunteered for this unit, only about 300 came home. My uncle came home. When life gets a bit overwhelming, I say a prayer and think of him . . . and realize my day was so much easier.

I spend my free time doing . . . I do not really have much free time but when I do, I like to visit antique auctions or go on road trips that usually end up somewhere with a lot of history. I find it very interesting looking back to see how people lived and the challenging times they went through. What I notice most is that everything new is old.

Favorite Bible verse... Daniel 6:24-6:28. King Darius wrote to all the peoples, nations and men of every language throughout the land: "May you prosper greatly. I issue a decree that in every part of my kingdom people must fear and reverence the God of Daniel. For he is the living God and he endures forever; his kingdom will not be destroyed, his dominion will never end. He rescues and he saves; he performs signs and wonders in the heavens and on the earth. He has rescued Daniel from the power of the lions."

My favorite thing about Dillsburg BIC is . . . Definitely the people. I have met so many kind, friendly and caring people since I have been coming to this church. I have to say it one more time; when I had surgery this summer, I had such a wonderful group of people visit, send cards, drop off meals or do chores, even people I had never met before. You will never know how much I appreciated it! It says a lot about the congregation and the support from this group of folks and how they look out for each other. The other (favorite) thing is where Pastor Rob and this

congregation go when discussing God. The message is current with the times such as drug addiction, human trafficking, crime, etc. Life is not perfect and we do not live perfect lives. The insight and encouragement to get up and go back out there in the world is given each and every week.



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~ STOP TRAFFIC ~

It has been some time since I have given an update on the ministry of Peace Promise. For those of you who may not be familiar with this ministry, they are one of our ministry partners. That means that we support them financially and in other ways as they reach out to women who are being exploited. This is usually in the context of adult clubs in the Harrisburg area, though they have also performed rescue for women and girls with whom they come into contact in other situations.



Several dancers have been able to find other jobs and have left the clubs behind. Others have gone on to higher education with their help and some have been able to get their GED. Patty Seamans, director of this outreach, is on call 24/7 in the lives of these women. Recently, she entered the life of a young dancer, who was from Dillsburg, in her early 20's, who became pregnant. Patty, also a counselor for Capital Area Pregnancy Center, was able to walk with her through the decision-making process of whether to abort, give her up or keep her baby. She decided to keep her baby. She is at peace with this decision and is currently living with a sister of a friend of hers who happens to be a Christian. God is so amazing.

Peace Promise has been involved in fundraising to hire Patty fulltime in the ministry. Their latest event, Blues, Jazz and BBQ, raised \$10,000. They are getting close to their goal. However, that is just the beginning as they are hoping to enter the second phase of their ministry to purchase and open up a walk-in center for exploited women. They have the personnel to offer services such as counseling, physical exams, transportation, life skills training, tutoring, a food bank and more.

Here at Dillsburg we gather to pray for this ministry as well as other ministries that are fighting human trafficking. We also provide meals every other month for the dancers at the clubs; we write notes of encouragement and we collect purses for Change Purse, which are then sold to raise money for ministries fighting trafficking. Some of us donate time and money to help out in their fundraising events.

Time Out! Talk about timing! As I am trying to write this, I am getting all kinds of texts from Patty and Krista Dollman, who heads up Change Purse. While Patty is at the hospital as coach for the young woman in labor, she has a friend picking up another young woman who is five months pregnant and on methadone and bringing her to Patty. As Patty puts it, "No plan at the moment but God has one." Krista has invited to dinner a young woman who is coming off addiction and is undergoing abortion recovery, her boyfriend and her 5-year-old daughter. As she does so, her own children are momentarily "off the wall, behavior wise." She refers to this as a rodeo. Perhaps it is kind of like dodging barrels and roping wild animals. Oh well, all in a day's work. This is what it is like for these ladies who don't hide their light under a bush, but are busy lighting up the darkness as they run head on into it.

I am going on faith. As I finish writing this, I have gotten word that a beautiful little baby girl has entered this world and I know she will find a much different home than she would have if God had not placed these ladies in her life.

To God be the glory. Thank you, Abba.

- Unseen, by Sara Hagerty. The subtitle of this book tells more about it: "The Gift of Being Hidden in a World That Loves to be Noticed. Hagerty encourages the soul. She teaches that the most fruitful and fulfilling life of service to God is off the beaten path, yet in the center of God's will.
- Brethren in Christ History & Life, August 2017. The first article in this issue, "Heresy: A Troublesome Word" was written by J. Robert Douglass. Dr. Luke Keefer had planned to write on the subject of heresy, but health issues prevented him for completing the study. - To Be Where You Are, by Jan Karon. When I checked the "New York Times Best-Selling Books of Fiction" this week, there it was at the very top . . . this latest book of the Mitford novels by Karon. My favorite "story" in the book was when Father Brad, who is Father Tim's successor at Lord's Chapel, called Father Tim for an appointment "in whatever confession booth you may have on hand."
