#### A bit about my family . . . .

JORDYN: My parents are Jeff and Aimee Scheib, and I have two younger brothers. Christopher graduated from Messiah College as a biomedical engineering major and is currently working at Hershey Med. Alex is a sophomore math education major at Messiah and runs cross country and indoor/outdoor track. There is never a dull moment when we are all together.

**TRAVIS:** My parents are Jay and Cindy Moyer, and I have four sisters. That's right: four sisters. My older sisters are Stephanie, Lindsay and Brittany; they all played field hockey for and graduated from Eastern University and are happily married. Natalie, my twin sister, is younger than me by a minute. She was born with cerebral palsy and lives at home, so she now enjoys the undivided attention of our parents.

#### I spend my days . . .

JORDYN: I teach eighth grade Language Arts at Halifax Middle School. When I'm not entertaining 14-year-olds in the classroom, I am working on my master's degree through Penn State so that I can eventually become a principal.

**TRAVIS:** I teach high school students mathematics at Northern High School and enjoy spending my day across the hall from local celebrity Tom Hatch.

#### How I became a Christian . . .

JORDYN: I grew up in a Christian home, so I was exposed to the Christian lifestyle from an early age. However, it wasn't until college that I truly got real with my faith. My coaches and teammates on the Messiah women's volleyball team had a huge role in my Christian walk.

This little one's mama is embracing motherhood with enthusiasm and a warm and loving heart. This is no small miracle considering this mama felt rejected all her life and, not too long ago, she was suicidal. God has done an amazing healing in her heart and soul. When she is ready, she has a job waiting for her at a respected facility in the area to work with young women who are suicidal. The father has made it known that he would like to be a part of his little girl's life. Only God knows how this



story will play out. By the way, this precious baby girl's name means "bringer of light from the valley." I don't know about you, but that gives me chills from head to toe. And all I can say is "Thank you, Abba."

Peace Promise and Change Purse had the opportunity to speak at Hope Grace Brethren's ladies retreat on November 4 here in Dillsburg. Patty Seaman, director of outreach for Peace Promise, spoke and told stories of the many women who have been helped over the years. Jenn Parsons spoke on behalf of Peace Promise and Change Purse, which are sister organizations. Both did an amazing job of describing their ministries and getting to the heart of what they do. There were about 50 to 60 women present. They raised more than\$600 for Peace Promise by selling purses. Many hearts were stirred and many have expressed a desire to get involved. Our hearts were gladdened by the response, and we gave glory to God for His generous provision.

In their three-year strategic plan, Peace Promise has outlined intentions of speaking at more events. They want to take their message to schools, colleges, churches and community partners. They will not only talk about their ministry, but will also raise awareness about sexual exploitation and the harms of pornography, which is the engine that drives the demand for trafficking. Of course, they will continue to provide services for those trapped in all aspects of exploitation.

These are very exciting times for this ministry, which began as a simple prayer movement back in 2008. Let's get behind them. There are many places in the ministry to plug into. Please talk to me if you would be interested in getting involved, and please continue to pray for Peace Promise.


#### **NONFICTION**

• **Before You Hit Send**, by Emerson Eggerichs. The author shows how to prevent misunderstandings and, when verbal or written blunders are made, how to enable others to get the right idea. Before communicating, ask if it is true, if it is kind, if it is clear? By the end of the book, we may put our foot in our mouth a little less than normal.

#### **FICTION**

- **Bringing Maggie Home**, by Kim Vogel Sawyer. While berry picking in a blackberry thicket, ten-year-old Hazel turned her back on her three-year-old sister, Maggie, and the young girl disappeared. This becomes a tragedy with many hurts along the way. As you read, you will wonder if they ever find out what became of Maggie . . . and you will read on to find out.
- A Time to Stand, by Robert Whitlow. Adisa Johnson, a young African-American attorney, is living her dream of practicing law with a prestigious firm in downtown Atlanta. She faces an unusual court case that will confront prejudices when a white police officer shoots an unarmed black teen who is now lying comatose in the hospital. Whitlow is a lawyer and writes books of legal mystery and suspense.
- *Child of the River*, by Irma Joubert. The setting of this book is South Africa at the dawn of apartheid. Persomi is a young girl, white and poor, born the middle child of illiterate sharecroppers on a farm in the South African bushveld. Her world is very small. She has never been to the local village, spending all her days in the squalor of her family home. But her isolated world is blown wide open and bigger dreams and opportunities open up to her. She discovers who she truly is, and why her life—and every life—matters.
