A Good Friday Miracle By Rachel Miller

If you're like me, sometimes you wonder what is taking God so long. Why hasn't he sent Jesus back to get us? Has he forgotten about us? Have we made the whole thing up? This is the story of a young(er) me asking God if He was still alive.

If I have enough faith, it won't break. He says He can move mountains; He can keep this egg from breaking. Those were the thoughts that went through my mind right before I hurled a raw egg over my house one Good Friday morning. Then, heart thumping in my chest, I went around the house to see what had become of the palegreen farm egg and what would become of my faith.

The details of where I heard about this Good Friday trick are fuzzy now, but I somehow got it into my ten-year-old head (ridiculously enough) that on this special day, you could throw an egg over your house and it would not break when it hit the ground. This was not the middle school egg drop contest. This was a normal, unaccompanied egg flying 20 feet in the air before hitting the cold, hard ground in spring. This was a divine intervention in the Law of Gravity - or so I hoped.

Now, you have to understand, I was both gullible and zealous as a kid. As soon as I heard about this possibility, I was excited to prove that the Bible was true and that faith as small as a mustard seed could keep an egg from breaking. Because, to be honest, I had already said to the mountain out my window, "move," and it did not move (which I theorized was because I didn't tell it where to move, and which I decided was probably for the best because my pastor lived up on that mountain).

You should also know that this was not the first time I'd attempted this egg-throwing stunt. On the first Good Friday after I became determined to attempt this feat, we were with Dad on a trip for work-turned-family-vacation

and staying in a 15-story hotel. I'd waited almost an entire year for this particular day, but it was clear that I was not going to throw an egg over a 15-story building not that I even had an egg. The next year rolled around and I was so excited to defy physics in the name of the Lord, but I was skeptical of my ability to actually get the egg over the house (if you'd seen me play softball, you'd understand). So, after some failed practice attempts with a racquetball, I asked my sister to do it.

"It won't work," she pointed out.

"I have enough faith for the both of us." I replied giddily.

She threw it. We zipped around the house only to discover a gooey mess. My heart sank. I was depressed all day. I don't remember talking about it, but I know my mom would have tried to debrief me to make sure my belief in God wasn't as broken as that egg's shell. Okay. So this Good Friday break in the Law of Gravity is not a thing. But isn't God bigger than the Laws of the universe He created? This should still work. I resolved to try it again.

Good Friday came around again—almost three years after I'd begun asking God to show me the impossible. This year, I was determined to do the egg experiment myself. No practice attempts; that signifies a lack of faith. No stand-in egg-throwers; this too suggests a lack of faith. Just a quick prayer and all my might sent through my arm and into that egg.

	Adult and Children's Sunday School (occurring simultaneously)


This means that if Sunday School is part of your spiritual formation, you will want to attend the 9 a.m. service.
