The Gift of an Unwanted Visitor By Pastor Rob Douglass

Have you ever had an experience of running into someone you did not want to see, at the worst possible moment, and having that encounter last without any idea of how or when it would end?

I had that experience recently.

What made this experience even more complicated and emotionally confusing is that my unwanted visitor brought me a gift that has created gratitude in me.

If you attend DBiC regularly or are connected with us in some way, you are likely aware that my younger sister is in a valiant battle with cancer. She is 46 and is dealing with two different kinds of cancer and what seems to be a never-ending list of complications from the fight.

Cancer is not a stranger to me or my family. He has come by for a visit before.

A little more than 20 years ago, my family walked a journey with him that included an unsuccessful bone marrow transplant for my dad.

As cancer has come by again for another visit, it has been interesting and painful to remember the feelings his presence brings. But the pain and fear of his last visit is not the only thing I am reminded of by his return, and this is the gift he accidentally brought.

When cancer is near, I cannot help but remember the preciousness and brevity of life. A great theologian named Jürgen Moltmann once wrote, "To push away every thought of death, and to live as if we had an infinite amount of time ahead of us, makes us superficial and indifferent. . . . To live as if there were no death is to live an illusion." Since cancer has come for another visit, I have found myself slowing down to a healthier pace, listening more intently, and hugging more.

When cancer is around, I am reminded that we are in a battle. The world that does not believe in anything it cannot touch, measure, or explain sees death as nothing but a biological process. Sigmund Freud taught that humans need to "make friends with the necessity of dying." However, we believe with Paul that death is the last enemy to be destroyed (I Cor 15.26), and we believe that it will be undone one day. As Augustine wrote, we hope in God "until the day breaks, and the shadows are removed."

I love the Lord of the Rings trilogy, and I think Peter Jackson did a wonderful job bringing the books to life on film. The one scene I wish would have made the transition from page to screen was the conclusion of the Return of the King. After all the drama had been settled and evil vanquished, Sam Gamgee wakes up and is surprised to still be alive. He then sees Gandalf and is surprised that he too is alive. Sam says, "Is everything sad going to come untrue? What's happened to the world?"

This is such a wonderful picture. Not only will our struggle be over, but the wrong, bad, bent, dead things in life will be made right, good, straight and alive.

Cancer may come for a visit, but he is not allowed to take up residence. The Lord of Life will never allow cancer or death to have the last word, and for the gift of this reminder, I am strangely grateful for my unwelcomed visitor.

NONFICTION

• *Emotionally Healthy Spirituality*, by Peter Scazzero. The subtitle of the book suggests it is impossible to be spiritually mature while remaining emotionally immature. The author outlines his own journey and the signs of emotionally unhealthy spirituality. He provides seven biblical ways to break through to the "life Christ meant for you."

FICTION

- The Solace of Water, by Elizabeth Byler Younts. After leaving her son's grave behind in Montgomery, Ala., Delilah has little faith that moving to her husband's hometown in Pennsylvania, in the heart of Amish country, will bring a fresh start. The last thing she imagines is becoming friends with her Amish neighbor, Emma Mullet.
- *Harvest of Rubies*, by Tessa Afshar. Afshar is one of the most favored authors of our DBIC library readers. She holds an MDiv from Yale University where she served as cochair of the Evangelical Fellowship of the Divinity School. In this book, the prophet Nehemiah's cousin has been made the queen's scribe, and in that role, Sarah comes to the very center of the Persian court. It's a demanding lifestyle for a Jewish lady including an arranged marriage!
- *Harvest of Gold*, also by Tessa Afshar. This is a second book of a two-book series. You will want to read this one *after* the first. When Nehemiah was called to head up the rebuilding of Jerusalem's broken-down walls, Sarah also is sent to Jerusalem. But what about the arranged marriage? You'll have to read the book to see what develops in that relationship.


DVDs

Congratulations to our quiz team on placing second in Denominational Finals, held during General Assembly at Messiah College!

The following churches had teams competing: Dillsburg, Fairview Avenue, Grantham, Harrisburg, Nappanee and Souderton. On Saturday, July 14, there was a double round robin, with every team quizzed every team two times. We had five quizzes in the morning and five quizzes in the afternoon, finishing in second place with a record of 8-2.

The double elimination bracket was Monday afternoon, July 16. For the final quiz between Dillsburg and Nappanee that evening, Nappanee had come through the losers' bracket and Dillsburg had come through the winners' bracket earlier in the day.
