All kinds of new books have been added to our library this month. There is a new commentary, a book about caregiving and new Christian books of fiction. When they are not checked out, they can be found on the cart just inside the doorway of the library.

NONFICTION

- Romans: Believers Church Bible Commentary, by John E. Toews. From the commentary foreward I write: "The term *believers church* has often been used in the history of the church. Since the 16th century, it has frequently been applied to the Anabaptists and later the Mennonites as well as to the Church of the Brethren and similar groups. *Believers Church* now represents specific theological understandings, such as believers baptism, commitment to the Rule of Christ in Matthew 18, belief in the power of love in all relationships, and willingness to follow Christ in the way of the cross. The writers chosen for the series stand in this tradition."
- The Caregiver's Toolbox, by Carolyn Hartley and Peter Wong. A caregiver among us has found this resource to be very helpful and recommended it for our library to be a valuable support for other caregivers. "These practical, easy-to-use tools are a blessing," writes a Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield representative.

FICTION

- The Fragment, by Davis Bunn. Master storyteller, Davis Bunn, vies faith with grit and the grandeur of Paris in the 1920s. At the Cathedral of Notre Dame, Bryan asks Muriel to photograph an astonishing artifact: a piece of the True Cross. When Muriel tries to authenticate the fragment, she encounters those who would attempt to steal and discredit it.
- River to Redemption, by Ann Gabhart. Adria was orphaned in the cholera epidemic of 1833. She was cared for by a slave named Louis, a man who passed up the opportunity to escape his bondage and instead tended to the sick and buried the dead. Twelve years later Louis is to be sold by his owners despite his heroic actions. What will Adria do now?
- **Send Down the Rain,** by Charles Martin. Allie is recovering from the loss of her family's beloved waterfront restaurant on Florida's Gulf Coast. Devastated and losing hope, she shudders to contemplate the future until a cherished person from her past returns.
- A Land to Call Home, by Lauraine Snelling. Hardy immigrants spend long, difficult years taming the prairie of Dakota Territory. In spite of heartache and back-breaking labor, the hardy immigrants recognize God has been with them every step of the way.
