Most of you who know me know I have somewhat of a one-track mind—and that one track usually has something to do with one four-legged canine friend or another. Volunteering at a local canine rescue has only magnified this line of thought. And those of you who know me have also probably noticed I am constantly, but shamelessly, peddling dogs on people.

"Do you have a dog?"

"Do you want a dog?"

"Do you want another dog?"

"Oh, but come on, you need a dog!"

These are common conversation starters for me with just about anyone.

I am dog-obsessed, and maybe it is irrational, but there's something about these animals that I can't get enough of.

Maybe it's that they don't say hurtful or critical things, and they always seem happy to see us, always want to be with us and seem always to be smiling. I've come to think that the nature of a dog seems pretty close to what every person should aspire to be.

I'm always amazed when dogs at the rescue, who come from unspeakably tragic and horrible situations, still greet me at their kennel door with a wagging tail.

Many dogs who find themselves in shelters can only equate humans with abuse or anger or neglect, yet they seem to forget all of that when they see a new face—a kind face.

Imagine if no matter how terribly others might treat us, we still showed love and kindness, grace and mercy, to all of the people we encounter.

I remember one night when the local dog warden dropped off a beautiful black and white pitbull at the

rescue. Now, think what you will about this breed, but I have never encountered so many loving, loyal and forgiving dogs as I have among the pitbulls throughout my years at the rescue.

This poor boy was terrified and immediately curled into the tightest ball I think he could manage in the back corner of his new kennel—not a luxurious place to find yourself, but probably preferable to the streets of Harrisburg where no doubt someone dumped him off.

He looked half-starved and had barely-healed wounds covering his body.

I sat outside of his kennel throwing treats in his direction for about an hour before he finally, slowly and cautiously, emerged from the safety of his corner and came to my hand.

He did a quick sniff, looked at me with uncertainty, then gave me a nice lick across the palm before returning to his safe spot.

This poor guy, whose backstory I would rather not try to imagine, only needed a matter of minutes to abandon his prior experiences with humans and trust again.

Over the next few months at the rescue, he transformed from that shaking shell of a dog to a confident and loving boy, who's now part of a loving family.


Through this interactive, in-depth study we will be trading feelings of emptiness and depletion for the fullness of knowing who Jesus is like never before!
