Eyes to See By Rachel Pease

When Jesus spoke in parables to his disciples and to the crowds gathered to hear him, he often ended by saying "If anyone has ears to hear, let him hear." In other passages, Jesus talked about having eyes to see as well. In Mark, he said to his disciples, "Do you still not see or understand? Are your hearts so hard? Having eyes, do you not see?"

So often, we think that what our eyes see is absolute reality. And yet, what we see can be influenced by our circumstances, clouded by our regrets, and veiled by our emotions. I know this is true in my own life. This past year, I have really struggled with having eyes to see what God has done and is doing in my life. In reality, I gave myself way too much credit for my own successes and failures. And, I was stuck in a pit of regret over career decisions I made in 2017 that led us to move out of state and then return back to Pennsylvania—all within six months. I spent a lot of time beating myself up over these decisions

and the price we paid for them—and all my eyes could see were my perceived mistakes.

This started to change when I made the decision to share what I was going through publicly. During prayer time at church, I shared that I was struggling with a deep depression. Several people in the group reached out to me. One encouraged me to see my doctor about medication, which I did. Another talked to me and said she sensed I was living in the past and being very harsh with

myself. Talking about what I was going through—and getting some medical help—allowed light to pierce the darkness I was in. Gradually I began to see more clearly what God is doing in and through my circumstances.

Not long after this sharing occurred, I read these words in Isaiah 43, verses 18-19. These words seemed to leap off the page at me, as if they were written just for me.

"Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. **See**, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not **perceive** it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland."

Take note of all of the action verbs that are required of us in this passage. Forget. Do not dwell. See. Perceive. The reality is, God is doing a new thing all around us whether we notice it or not. But do we have eyes to see? Are we actively working to forget the former things? Are we making the decision not to dwell on the past? Are

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we perceiving God's reality or are we allowing our eyes to see what we have always seen – the desert, the wasteland, and the old things around us?

Asking for eyes to see the new thing that God is doing in my life has allowed me to perceive that the decision that I thought had ruined my career has actually set me in a new direction. At Messiah Lifeways, I am impacting God's kingdom through my work. I am meeting wonderful people who are using their gifts to bless others in meaningful, God-honoring ways. I no longer have to travel extensively to meet the demands of my job and be away from my family for 40 to to 50 nights per year in order to meet my employer's expectations. I am more of a partner with Nathan in parenting our children, and I'm able to be there for concerts, performances, and family dinners.

Could it be that I never would have left the rat race I was in had I not made the decision to take the job in Indiana? Could it be that our family is more blessed now than we ever were before making that "mistake?" Is it possible that I am uniquely gifted and suited for my role at Messiah Lifeways and that God has used all I learned at various institutions over the course of 16 years to enable me to do this job at this time? Is there a purpose for me that I did not formerly see?

I am starting to believe the answer to those questions is yes.

I know I'm not alone in struggling with depression, living in the past, and dwelling on mistakes. These are realities we must talk about more in the church. It took a combination of prayer, sharing, and medication to allow me to break free of the depression that kept me in the dark.

If you are struggling with something similar, reach out. Ask for help. Talk to someone. Get medical help. Sometimes God uses outside interventions in order to give us eyes to see His hand at work, the ability to perceive how he is making a way in the wilderness of our hearts, and the recognition that he is bringing living water into the wasteland of our regrets and failures.

Christopher is a volunteer with Grassroots Development Initiative (GDI), a local organization in Kisumu that works to promote peaceful environments in schools.

This year's theme is "Celebrating Community. Creating Hope." Mennonite Central Committee is our Brethren in Christ relief agency. They give aid to victims of poverty and other man-made and natural disasters. MCC also helps with economic development, agricultural methods and peacebuilding projects around the world.

The purpose of the relief sale is to raise money for MCC. The main attraction is the quilt auction, but there are lots of other items to purchase—flowers, food (come for supper Friday night or breakfast and lunch on Saturday), books, country auction, crafts and a Ten Thousand Villages store. All the proceeds go to MCC.

My Coins Count is counted at the Relief Sale. Last year's My Coins Count raised \$151,292.11. This year, the proceeds from My Coins Count will be designated toward MCC's peace initiatives. MCC believes God calls us to a life of peace and nonviolence. We actively promote the pursuit of peace as we:

- Teach conflict resolution skills and peacebuilding strategies
- Encourage people to courageously choose peace over violence
- Address systemic injustices that can lead to violence
- Facilitate interfaith dialogue and relationship-building across cultural, racial and ethnic divides
- Build resilience and respond to psychological needs through trauma healing
- Provide churches with educational and advocacy resources about peace
- You can join MCC in partnering with peacemakers around the world. A gift of peace gives people the skills

NONFICTION

- Brethren in Christ History & Life, December 2018. This issue of the BIC denominational history was particularly interesting to me, and will be for many of you. You will read about the Macha School of Nursing and the Macha Hospital in Zambia. Many of us will be interested in the articles about "cradle BIC" written by individuals born into BIC families with deep roots in the church. And then there are four book reviews in this edition. Two of the books are written or edited by individuals in our congregation.
- Anxious for Nothing, by Max Lucado. This book was ordered before it was chosen to be the text of a Sunday school class. If you are not in the class, you may be interested in reading it. Lucado is a favorite author of our library. About the book Lucado writes, "With God as your helper and Philippians 4:6-7 at your side, you can sleep better tonight and smile more tomorrow."
- Grandma Gatewood's Walk, by Ben Montgomery. Donated by Marilyn Smith, the subtitle of this hike is "The inspiring story of the woman who saved the Appalachian Trail." Emma Gatewood was 67 years old and 5 foot 2, when she set out to walk the Appalachian Trail . . . walking in a pair of canvas Keds. Her journey is quite amazing. Read all about it!
- *The Broken Way*, by Ann Voskamp. Discover and trust this broken way . . . the way to not be afraid of broken things. This book deals with the authentic way forward.

FICTION

- Auschwitz Lullaby, by Mario Escobar. Many of our library readers enjoy historical fiction. This book is an excellent example of historical fiction based on a true story. In 1943, Helene Hannemann is preparing her five children for the day when the German police arrive at her home. Her worst fears come true when the police arrive under strict orders from the SS.
- **Becoming Mrs. Lewis,** by Patti Callahan. When poet and writer Joy Davidman began writing letters to C. S. Lewis, she was looking for spiritual answers, not love. Joy was a New Yorker and seemed quite ill-matched for an Oxford don . . . the beloved writer of Narnia . Read the continued story.
- Ours for a Season, by Kim Vogel Sawyer. Anthony and Marty Hirschler are part of an Old Order Mennonite community in Indiana. The couple has grown apart when a doctor confirmed they would never have children. Will they be

able to overcome their differences to help ones who are hurting?
