To Be Like God

My ten-year-old daughter Gloria came home from school recently with a story that caught my attention. Gloria and a classmate had both completed a project that involved cutting shapes out of paper, and both of them had dutifully recycled their paper scraps. But some extra scraps ended up on the floor, and no one was eager to pick those up. When the teacher walked by and asked the other student to clean up the scraps, that student shifted the blame onto Gloria, who bent down and cleaned up the mess instead.

As I listened to my daughter tell her story, I was reminded of the way in which childhood is such good practice for adulthood. I empathized with Gloria over the injustice in the situation, but I also told her that she did the right thing when she chose to pick up the paper scraps. Growing into maturity requires a lot of swallowing pride and bending down to clean up messes—even messes that we did not make.

In the book of Ephesians, Paul encourages the believers to "follow God's example as dearly loved children and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:1-2). If love looks like Jesus, love looks like humility, submission, self-sacrifice... and ultimately, joy. We love because God loved us first. We serve because God served us first. We walk in the way of love as dearly loved children, trusting that as we put others first, we will know the abundance of life in God's economy.

Self-sacrifice does not play well with human nature, though. The first humans ran smack into this problem as they stood under a fruit tree and debated what God really meant when he said they could eat fruit from any tree except the tree in the middle of the garden. Satan, in the form of a serpent, joined Adam and Eve by the tree and whispered, "You will not certainly die. For God knows that when you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil" (Genesis 3:4-5). Adam and Eve ate the fruit, and they did indeed know evil.

I have sometimes wondered why God put that tree in the Garden of Eden. Why tempt humans with forbidden fruit, especially when everyone knows that forbidden things are the most desirable? In his book "A More Christlike God: A More Beautiful Gospel," Bradley Jersak shares this insight: "God's command was not about putting us in our place but, rather, lifting us to the image of the divine. God yields power to us by giving us the dignity of choice. Then by consenting to lay that power down, we become like him!"

One of the great ironies here is that Adam and Eve had a chance to "be like God," but not by listening to Satan. If Adam and Eve had chosen to obey God—if they had been willing to sacrifice their own desires and to trust God's intentions—they would have become like him. But they did not. Many years later, however, under a different tree in a different garden, Jesus was also tempted by Satan. Like Adam and Eve, Jesus was tempted to take what he wanted: a way out that would avoid suffering and self-sacrifice. But Jesus chose the higher, harder calling. Jersak writes, "Satan offered a shortcut to power, bypassing the cross. But



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Christ saw through it, passed the test and truly fulfilled what humanity was destined for—the perfection of the divine image—by laying down power, yielding to the Father and mediating God's redeeming love to the whole world."

My daughter's struggles over a handful of paper scraps seem minor compared to Jesus' struggles in the Garden of Gethsemane. But I believe that every single time we choose to die to ourselves, we become a little more like God. Every time we choose to swallow our pride, to bend down, and to trust that obeying God's instructions will lead to life, God is glorified.

May it be so!

THIS MONTH'S SPOTLIGHT: TONY & VERONICA BEERS ZAMBIA

HARD THINGS

We have had a lot of setbacks in the past few months. Veronica has developed epilepsy and has had several seizures since our last update. This has involved a family medical trip to the capital city to get imaging done and adjusting to her new memory challenges. We are still working out Veronica's new medications to combat this issue. We have hired a domestic worker so that there is someone in the house during the day who can get help if Veronica has a seizure when I am away.

The puppy that we got Lilly for Christmas died of Parvo virus three weeks after we got it. It was heart wrenching watching our puppy wither away to nothing over the course of a week. This was very hard on us.



Finally, the rains in Zambia this year have been very disappointing. They started late and never really worked up to full force and stalled out early. As a result, many local farmers are expecting to lose most of their harvest this year.

OUR GIRLS

Lilly is now in third grade here at Nahumba Basic School. She finished third in her class overall last year. Lilly has school in the mornings and finishes by noon. We also have a comprehensive curriculum book that she does work in outside of class to make up for the short days.

Lilly and Mutinta are neighbors and inseparable friends. They are always sharing meals together and exploring the neighborhood, picking wild fruits, and climbing trees.

Natasha is our little wild child. We never know what she is going to get into next. She frequently runs off. We usually find her at the neighbor's houses, eating cookies or nshima.

LANGUAGE STUDY

We are working on Citonga language study part 2... We have hired my friend Ginwell Yooma's son Benson to be our new Citonga facilitator. We have been using a grammar book to organize the lessons and have developed a card-based table game to help practice speaking and verb manipulation... Language study is going well overall but Veronica's seizures and resulting short term memory loss is causing frustration.

COMPASSIONATE MINISTRIES

Work is moving forward with the Compassionate Ministries projects. Much of Tony's time is spent working with water and agriculture projects.

PRAYER REQUESTS

- Pray that we will be able to manage Veronica's epilepsy effectively and that her memory will improve
- That Tony will be able to get his driving license [He has, praise the Lord!]
- That the BICCZ chicken project will help local farmers with income generation, especially considering this year's drought
- That the pump trainings will help communities to manage and maintain their handpumps
- That the long slow process of growing trees and grasses and learning conservation farming will have long-term benefits for the BIC church and its neighbors

FAITH FINDERS: YOU'RE RUNNING A SCHOOL!

WE MET OUR GOAL!! And you, the congregation of DBIC, helped us quadruple that goal!

At the beginning of this year, Faith Finders kids had a Cross Cultural Theme Night where they learned what it was like to be a child living in Pakistan. That night, we introduced the kids to our offering project to raise money to send Christian kids to school in Pakistan through the FGA Education Project.

We started a boys vs. girls offering competition and the kids ran with it. We set a goal of raising \$500, and in two months we met our goal. We then challenged the kids to raise \$1,000 with a promise of a pizza party at the last Eat N Run if they met their goal. It was close but on our last week before our finale, the kids reached their goal with a total of \$1,105.01! While the boys had some victories along the way, in the end, the girls won the overall competition bringing in \$587.99 vs. the boys \$517.02.

A few of our Faith Finders kids who attend Sunday School invited the adult Sunday School classes to partner with us in our offering project and challenged the adults to a boy vs. girl teacher offering (Brent's class vs. Faithe's class). Our challenge was accepted, and the following week Brent's class was victorious with \$634 while we received a close second of \$611 from Faithe's class.

After our final night of Faith Finders, the kids raised a total of \$1,255, and our grand total with additional adult giving was \$4,500.

This is enough money to run one school for an entire school year.

Thank you, thank you, thank you to everyone who partnered with us to make this a reality.
