# What Occupies Your Days?

This fall I sent my youngest daughter off to first grade, so for the first time in more than 11 years, I am enjoying regular times of solitude during the week. This has been a healthy change for me, but even welcome changes bring new questions and considerations.

As a stay-at-home mom, I find the question "What do you do?" a difficult one to answer. I wear many hats, including those of homemaker, student, freelance writer, ministry coordinator, teacher, and school volunteer. But that's usually more than the other person wants to know. Years ago, a thoughtful stranger asked me instead, "What occupies your days?" I immediately felt relieved and grateful, and now this is the question I ask others. I find that it opens the door wider for the other person—regardless of age or employment—to share a glimpse into their life.

Even as a teenager, I was prone to over-analyzing my life. My mother once gave me gracious advice in the form of a Bible verse: "When God gives someone wealth and possessions, and the ability to enjoy them, to accept their lot and be happy in their toil—this is a gift of God. They seldom reflect on the days of their life, because God keeps them occupied with gladness of heart" (Ecclesiastes 5:19-20). I think about those verses, and I wonder if someday I will be brave enough to answer the question "What do you do?" by saying, "Me? I am occupied by gladness of heart."

I recently stumbled upon a podcast called *The Next Right Thing*, written and narrated by Christian author Emily P. Freeman. In every episode, Freeman offers a simple bit of advice about how to make thoughtful choices. She reminds her listeners that in an average day, each of us will make 35,000 decisions—and whether or not we realize it, those decisions will shape our lives.

I appreciate Freeman's suggestions about creating space, talking to mentors, allowing for imperfection, and listening to God. But even more, I love the way that she reminds me to take off my crown, to shed my worry and anxiety, because I am not in charge of the kingdom of God. Some of the most-repeated words in the podcast are a few lines that Freeman borrows from one of her teachers, James Bryan Smith. He writes:

I am one in whom Christ dwells and delights.

I live in the strong and unshakeable kingdom of God.

The kingdom is not in trouble, and neither am I.

Isn't that beautiful? The longer I sit with those words, the more I am convinced of their truth and power. Yes, I have many decisions to make today. I have work to do; I have people to love. But that is not my primary vocation. My deepest calling—and your deepest calling—reaches beyond any job, activity, or daily task. We are called to be people in whom Christ dwells and delights.

I find it notable that God the Father pronounces his blessing on Jesus the Son before he even starts his earthly ministry. When Jesus comes up out of the water after his baptism, he has not done anything remarkable yet. He has not healed the lame, or fed the five thousand, or raised the dead. And yet this is the moment when God chooses to say, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17).

#### VOLUME RISING: MEET DBIC'S NEW WORSHIP INTERN



This fall, we welcome Jacob Fitzmaurice as our worship intern.

You've seen him up front and heard his amazing voice for a couple of months now. Here's your chance to get to know him a little better.

Q: Please tell us where you are from, a bit about your growing-up years and your family.

I am from Syracuse, N.Y. I grew as up an only child with just me and my mom. I started music when I was in fourth grade with my school band and learned French horn. Later, I picked up guitar before entering high school. I would then lead worship at my church, compete in competitions for instrumental solos/dramas through the AG fine arts program, play in a jazz big band in my high school, participate in musical theater shows and play in all-county and all-state wind ensemble and orchestra festivals.

Q: What year are you in college, and what's your major?

I am in my third year of studying music and worship at Messiah College. This major functions to learn both music theory and theology of worship. My primary instrument for school is the French horn. While I lead in the Dillsburg BIC context, I will be playing guitar and singing.

Q: What got you interested in doing an internship here and what will it entail?

I was traveling with Messiah College Seven and we made a stop at DBIC. The loving community, hospitality of the church and relaxed atmosphere was something I was looking for in a church community of my own. So, I decided after the service to attend DBIC in the fall semester. Later I heard that there would be a possible internship opening and thought it would be a cool way to get involved in the community, so I emailed Pastor Douglass to ask if I could serve.

In the internship, I plan to serve the congregation through helping to run rehearsals, leading the DBIC community in songs of worship and finding ways to get to know and be a part of the larger community we call church.

# Q: What do you love most about making music?

I guess it's just one of those things—I can't really think of a world where music wouldn't be involved, where someone could honestly say they never sang in the shower or tapped to the beat of a tune with a pencil. We all love to be a part of it. It's sharing that with my family in Christ that makes it mean something. It's the little moments when we are in a song worship and I can just step back from the mic, or look up from my hymn book and see my family singing together.

Q: How do you think singing/playing/ hearing music enhances one's personal worship or relationship with Christ?

Music has always been historically in the church. The longer I worship and study God, the more I realize the corporate nature of what worship is. It's not hearing the music for me that brings me into the presence of God, but conversing with him—realizing who he is, being in awe of his goodness, responding to him, being called into community to faith. This is all worship.

# Q: Do you hope to pursue a career involving music?

I do hope I am able to continue pursuing a career in music . . . whether in a church, maybe a rock band or as a solo artist. Who knows? Yet, I am certain God has called me to sing his name wherever I go. I do hope I am able to continue a pursue a career in music.

Q: What are your hobbies?

In my spare time, I enjoy journaling, writing my own songs, watching a good movie and most importantly eating good food!

Q: How can we be praying for you?

Please join me in the prayer that I am led to take the best steps to build our church and, as a student, I will never deny a prayer for strength and endurance to keep up with classes and homework.



## Changing lives, one donation at a time: THANK You!

Our church family is very generous with supporting local ministries. This month we received a couple of great stories from organizations we support. They are a great reminder that the people we help are people just like us who need a helping hand at a certain point in life—and we are blessed to be able to extended that to them in some small way.

#### This story comes from Paxton Ministries in Harrisburg:

"People don't understand why I have such a positive attitude after all I've been through," says George. His story is difficult, and it would be easy for him to fall into self-pity and despair. He shares it in hopes it will be an inspiration to others.

Raised in New Jersey, George and his nine siblings lived with their parents in a one-bedroom apartment. He says that at age 10, he started drinking alcohol, smoking and doing drugs. He has no happy memories of his youth and no contact with any family members. "I was raised to believe I was a loser, not worth anything," George says quietly.

Those feelings, coupled with his addiction troubles, contributed to his depression and suicidal thoughts, which led to multiple hospitalizations. He tried his hand at many different careers, including owning a restaurant, auto body work, home remodeling and factory jobs, but he faced disappointment when various jobs and ideas failed to flourish.

When his marriage ended abruptly several years ago, George was left on his own. He is reluctant to say much about where he lived after that, except that it was "not a good situation." All of this took a toll on his health, and he started forgetting to eat and take his medications. In a short period of time, he went from living independently to "sitting in a wheelchair in a nursing home."

As George regained some health, his caseworker helped him look for a new place to live. Paxton Ministries seemed like a great prospect, and his first visit left a good impression. Just a few weeks ago, George moved in. His remarkably cheerful attitude is helping him settle in well and make new friends.

He hopes to live independently again, but in the meantime, he gives thanks that his new home is "giving me a chance to relax, get my head together and start formulating plans for the future."

He says, "I've had many, many situations when I should have been dead. This place has given me another chance in life."

This story comes from Susan Vigliano, president of the board, and Patty Seaman, executive director, Peace Promise in Mechanicsburg.

In the past month, we had an amazing opportunity to host a "family" weekend with one of our survivors.

During that visit, we went to a local café. As we were leaving, we had a conversation with a couple of women who were seated nearby. They read the survivor's shirt, which said "Girls are not for sale" and asked about it. We explained that we work with Peace Promise to bring hope and healing to women exploited in the commercial sex industry in central Pennsylvania.

One of the women went on to say how horrible it is that women are brought here from other countries and sold. Our survivor was able to look at her and explain that yes, that is horrible, but also to ask if she is aware that most of the women being exploited and trafficked in our area are local girls. We were able to share that most of these women once went to local schools with our children, they shop in local stores and they even visit local cafes like the one we were standing in.

When we left, the survivor looked at me and said, "That was great, we got to educate them. Honestly, I used to believe the same thing – until it happened to me. Now I see where I was trafficked for years without even knowing it was happening." And the women we had spoken with will probably never know they had just been educated on sex trafficking by a survivor from their own neighborhood.




## THIS MONTH'S SPOTLIGHT: WALSH FAMILY BURKINA FASO

Eighteen months ago, the Walsh family left the East for a 10-day trip and, due to the security situation, has not been able to return. This has created a challenge for Open Door Development: While our Burkinabe team has done a great job of continuing most core activities, even growing into new areas of work, managing ODD from a distance is both unsustainable and limiting the local team's ability to grow.

As a result, we've decided to transition the ODD team from employees to independent contractors. Each will now manage a particular area of work (water system, farm fields, equipment, etc.), allowing them to earn a living and potentially expand in new ways.



One new area we're working on is Better Bearings, a project in partnership with Aligned Works to test improved bearings for the India MKII hand pump. We've partnered with a church group that already actively maintains 100-plus wells in southwest Burkina, so they can draw on their network to test these bearings.

#### Village water update

In our last newsletter, we shared about the village's upcoming decision to either accept a new water system funded by a large NGO or remain with the potentially smaller ODD system. Last week, Timothé, who manages the water system, visited Matt and showed him a video of the vote. It was moving to see almost all of the 100-plus people raising their hand and chanting, "ODD! ODD!" We are grateful for the community's confidence in ODD despite our absence.



#### Praise & prayer

- Pray for the security situation in Burkina Faso, for all those affected by the violence and especially for those who have had to leave their homes.
- Pray that our team would not feel abandoned but rather emboldened by their freedom and the confidence we have in them.
- Pray for the drill rig prototype as we move into further testing and then begin building the production model.
- Pray for the partnership with the church denomination in the Southwest to test Better Bearings.
- Praise the Lord for the village's confidence in ODD! Pray that we'd continue to effectively manage the water system and have the resources necessary for ongoing maintenance.
- Pray that we'd adapt to the new government-imposed prices, taxes, and supervision of the water system.
