Questions in the Dark

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance (John 20:1).

With these words, the apostle John begins his telling of the Easter story, and most of us know how the events unfold from there. Mary Magdalene runs to find Simon Peter and John, who quickly hurry to the tomb to see this wonder for themselves. The men peek inside and find the grave clothes, but not Jesus' body, and they leave puzzled. But Mary lingers there in the dark of early morning, sad and confused.

In the church calendar, the season of Lent marks the 40 days (plus Sundays) leading up to Easter. Lent is a time when we, like Mary Magdalene, sit in the dark and wait. We sit in the dark of unknowing, in the cold ashes of a fire gone out, in the barren wilderness. We believe that something more is coming—we feel it deep in our bones—but right now, we are hurting and disappointed and unsure. Like Mary, we wonder... Where is Jesus? Why did he allow this death to happen? What are we to do?

When Jesus at last comes to Mary by the entrance to his tomb, he does what Jesus often does: He asks questions. "Woman, why are you crying?" he says, then follows up with one of his favorites, "Who is it you are looking for?" (John 20:15). Even in a moment as agonizing at this one, Jesus is intentional in his interactions. Like the good teacher he is, Jesus knows that the answers to his questions are not as important as the process of journeying toward them. But Mary does not recognize Jesus. She mistakes him for the gardener, and in her desperation to find Jesus' body she pleads, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him" (John 20:15).

I have been like Mary Magdalene, desperate to do something to make a situation better. I have flailed my

words and arms around thinking that some action will help. But as I ponder the scene on this first Easter morning, I recognize that beautiful things emerge in the stillness of the darkness before the dawn. As Mary lingered there by the tomb, she encountered the risen Christ. And while I do not know what would have happened had she walked away with Simon Peter and John, I do know that her willingness to wait in that place of heart-breaking hope was richly rewarded.

Somewhat surprisingly, my mind has returned to Christmas.

On the one hand, I love the idea. First, I love Christmas. Second, I love Christmas lights. Third, what could it hurt? It would get us out of the house and give us something to do while we are "distancing" ourselves from one another.

On the other hand, it seems a bit silly to think that little light bulbs could change much. They can give us a moment of pleasure or a fleeting smile, but

they can't kill germs, repel fear or banish depression—at least not for long. They don't put food on the grocery store shelves or really connect us to other people.

While the lights can't change much, the One to whom the lights point changes everything.

It does not take much effort to compare how our experience with this disease parallels the effect that sin has had on humanity. Everyone has been impacted in some way, and two of the results have been that we are separated from one another and that we are too familiar with fear.

God's remedy for sin is also his word for us in this disease. He is forever "Immanuel." He has overcome the "distance" that separates. Not only has the distance been eliminated, he also wants his people to be free from fear.

This is new to us, but he has been here before. He who touched the lepers will stay with those who are now feeling socially isolated. We read that perfect love drives out all fear (I John 4.18). Jesus is Immanuel and is himself, perfect love personified. May his presence with you cause all your fears to be afraid and flee. His name is Immanuel, Perfect Love with Us!

Maybe I will put up those lights, after all.





In the Christian faith, we hold onto the paradox that death precedes life. The blazing glory of Easter morning is inextricably tied to the piercing agony of Good Friday. Those who mourn know the most tender comfort; those who sorrow know the sweetest joy. Love keeps Mary Magdalene there by the tomb, and love greets her with a single word: "Mary" (John 20:16). Jesus reveals himself to his friend by simply speaking her name, and I believe that Jesus wants to reveal himself to us in this way as well.

I do not know what grief you carry in your soul, but I pray that you will have the good courage this month to sit and wait by the empty tomb. Speak your honest questions into the dark. Hear the questions Jesus offers in return. And know that the God who meets you in your pain is the God with nail-scarred hands. He too has experienced betrayal, suffering, and death. He has been made new, and as he speaks your name; you too can be made new.

But we both felt unsettled, like God was calling us into something new. We started looking at some other jobs in other states, and when Seth accepted a position in central Pennsylvania, we had so much immediate confirmation from God that this is what He had for us. In a time of lots of transition and potential stress, we really felt God's presence.
