What have you been thankful for this week?

How did you express your thanks?

There is an interesting story in Amos 7. You may want to read it together.

In verse 14, we read,

¹⁴ Then Amos replied to Amaziah, "I am not a prophet, nor am I the son of a prophet; for I am a herdsman and a grower of sycamore figs. ¹⁵ But the LORD took me from ^[n] following the flock and the LORD said to me, 'Go prophesy to My people Israel.'

So there is this connection with Amos and sycamore trees (and figs).

A few verses earlier, we read about Amos pleading with God to spare or forgive Jacob (the nation of Israel).

In verse 5 we read,

⁵ Then I said,

"Lord God, please stop!
How can Jacob stand, for he is small?"

In both passages (Amos 7 and Luke 19) there is a connection between the small size of someone (Jacob and Zacchaeus) and sycamores.

Is it right or wrong to make a connection? Do you think that these details are coincidental or should if we be understanding something from it? If it is not coincidental, what might that be?
