A Gray Place with Little Gray Space By Pastor Rob Douglass

As some of you know, Andrew and I were (and as I write this, are) in Mumbai, India. I have only started to process the experience, but I wanted to share some of my thoughts while they are fresh.

I have been out of the States before, but this is without question the most radical departure from what I am accustomed.

The impact was not really an issue of learning something new. There is little that I saw or experienced that I did not know about beforehand, but it is one thing to know facts about something and another to be in it.

I found Mumbai to be a gray place. It wasn't gray because it was without color. The truth is that there was color everywhere, from the vibrant colors of the women's clothing to the murals on the walls of the highways. It wasn't gray because of a lack of vegetation. While I didn't see any lawns on our trip, there were trees and shrubs everywhere I looked. In fact, the reason India seemed gray to me was also the reason it was so green. This is because we were in Mumbai during the monsoon season.

It rained every day for multiple hours. I believe only three days had a few hours of beautiful sunlight, but most of the time we saw and experienced nothing but rain clouds.

While I found the place to be gray because of the weather, in another way it was a place without much gray space. Let me explain what I mean.

In America, we obviously have our share of poverty, but those places seem to be clumped together. We talk about "that side of the tracks" or "that side of town." In Mumbai there were no such divisions.

A new looking beautiful office building sits next to an apartment building with bamboo scaffolding around the outside, looking like it would be condemned if it were in the United States. One day we went to south Mumbai and drove through an area with many new, posh, high-rise buildings that offered refined housing for those that could pay. At the foot of those buildings were camps of huts, all of which only had plastic tarps for roofs. Things were either rich or poor. There was no real in-between. There did not seem to be much gray space in India.

I did not experience gray space spiritually either.

In the mall that we visited one day, there was a store with nothing but statues and images of Hindu gods. It was obvious that it was not simply a souvenir or knick-knack shop. On many corners, there are people who are selling little flower garlands that have been presented to Hindu gods. Others sold special religious powders that could give you power. There is much darkness in India.

The saddest thing was the people who were begging in the streets. In certain parts of town, if you catch a red light, there are people who come by and gently put their hand on the window of your car. The person with us told us they were victims of human sex trafficking. Then there were the kids.

India estimates that there are 300,000 children forced to beg year. According to the most recent census, Harrisburg has a population of about 50,000 people. So, there are 6 Harrisburgs of children begging in the streets of India on any given day. Even more sadly, the Indian government estimates

that 40,000 children are abducted in India each year. Most are believed to be forced into lives of begging for cartels that operate in all of the major cities.

The depth or darkness in India is hard to fathom, but as I said earlier, the sun (Son) did shine.

One of the blessings of this trip was spending time with a young man named Eben. A



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devout Christian and the son of a pastor, he is finishing his master's degree in zoology.

Once he has completed his studies, his plan is to move to Dubai. His father's family recently relocated there, but after the move both his uncle and the husband of his cousin died. I asked if he was going to try to work in a zoo there, and he laughed and said, "No, no. I won't be working in a zoo. I am going there because it would be meaningful for my father. It will make my father happy."

Serving someone in significant need because it would make your father happy sounds very much like Jesus to me.

While I was surprised by what I encountered in India and grateful to be back in America, I can't help but wonder if the danger for us isn't as great or greater. Does the gray around us make it easier or harder to discern light from darkness?

Are we able to see the ways that those around us are in bondage to demonic powers? Do we see the glory of Christ in our land where there is plenty of gray? Just because our poor aren't in the streets begging, and the victims of sexual exploitation and trafficking in our area aren't putting their hands on our windows, do we see them and their plight? Do we see those who are bound and trapped as trophies of the enemy? Can we see the light of Christ shining in our communities, our conversations with those we know and in the people we meet?

Perhaps the issue is not ultimately one about which situation is better or worse. Maybe we need to hear Jesus say again, "Do you have eyes but fail to see, and ears but fail to hear?" (Mark 8.18)

May our eyes and ears be open to both the light of Christ and the darkness around us and may we respond to both appropriately. May we be ready to give ourselves away because it would make our Father happy.

With great excitement, we announce that Peace Promise has purchased a building to be used to provide opportunities for employment for the those who are ready to join the work force.


The plan includes having a coffee shop using the business plan, Ruby's Coffee & Co., developed by two Messiah graduates. Their plan won first place in the Impact Venture Challenge at Messiah University. They would have responsibility for running the business with help from Peace Promise.

The plan for this building also includes, finally, a permanent place where the ladies can make soaps and lotions and sell them and a place to store all the supplies and equipment. Up to this point they have had to move to facilities and even homes that were available. Last month, as you may recall, I wrote about the growth of industry provided for the ladies in the production and sale of soaps and lotions.



Also, due to the new partnership with local law enforcement, Peace Promise is growing in the number of ladies we serve. This is a blessing to us, but it also presents a hurdle that we are facing. New lives = new expenses for rehabilitation, support and programs to help them not only survive, but thrive.

Needless to say with these new developments, there is an increased need for financial support. To help finance the new outreach needs for the ladies, we are offering a limited edition soft-style Peace Promise shirt featuring beautiful artwork designed by one of our volunteers. ### Grounding Grace By Chou Gabikiny

"In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans." Romans 8:26, New International Version

It's been brewing in my heart for a couple of weeks. The thought of my dad having cancer saturated my mind. I am sad that he has to deal with such a horrible disease, but even more so, I'm concerned about the diseases in his soul and the wounds in our relationship. When the diagnosis was confirmed, I was at a conference for work and found myself sobbing uncontrollably in the hallway. My logical mind could rationalize that things were not as bad, that it's a good thing for him to be in the U.S. and not in Africa in this season of his life. He has great medical coverage through his employer and would have access to good medical care. All those things were true, but so were the achings of my heart.

The week prior to my dad's diagnosis being confirmed, my daughter started experiencing severe earaches. A trip to the urgent care revealed that she had fluid in her ears, both of her ear canals were inflamed, and the tube in her left ear was not visible. Her hearing has also been impacted. Even after a week on steroids, things were not back to where we expected. Two weeks after the treatment was completed, we got an appointment with a specialist almost two and a half hours away; and we have to wait for another month to be seen. All the while, her hearing has not fully recovered. As her mom, I want to fix it. I want to take the pain away. I want to preserve her hearing. I want to see this specialist right this very instant. However, I have very little control over all of this. So, we wait and pray, but prayer becomes different in moments like this.

There are times when the aching of our hearts is so deep that we can't find the words to pray. It hurts so badly that words are not enough, or perhaps the issue is so complex that we don't even know what to ask for in prayer. I am having more



and more of those moments... when tears won't stop, when lips are too heavy to utter a syllable... so I sit, lay, or crawl up in total surrender because there is no human being who can fix it but God. I wish I could express myself ... yet, the words won't come... so in silence I dwell. In that silence, I started thinking about how limited we are as humans and that even as extensive as our languages are, none of them could fully describe all that we feel or all that we want to express.

I believe it's in moments like this that the Holy Spirit comes to our rescue. Maybe prayer is not about having all the words, knowing what to say, what to ask for, or even asking for anything. Prayer is becoming more of a place of solace for me. It gives me the grace to come as I am, to cry if I need to, to talk if I can, but most importantly to commune with God in whichever way I am able to at that moment, knowing that everything I can or will do will never fully cover what my hearts feels. But's that is perfectly fine because the One who created us knows us best and understands not just our longings but even our groans and our silence as complete sentences.

I am starting to think that praying without ceasing (1Thesalonians 5:17-19) is not all about talking; that wouldn't be possible and many, if not all of us, already feel guilty about not praying as much as we should or could. Could it be possible that we see prayer more as a task than simply communicating with God? As a parent, the way I communicate with my three children differs greatly. Whether it's a word, a gesture, a look, I can communicate the same message in so many ways and each of my children will receive one way much better than the other. I wonder if it's the same way with our Heavenly Father. He is always communicating, but are we?

Anne Converse Willkomm, a clinical assistant professor at Drexel University, proposes five ways of communication: verbal, non-verbal, written, listening and visual. If prayer is communication with God, then I don't always have to talk to pray. All my nonverbals are also prayers, whether it's a sigh or a tear. My moment of awe when I am staring at the sunset is a prayer. Listening to the birds sing outside my bedroom window as I am writing this is prayer. Visualizing how life could be different is prayer. Wishing someone well or sending them a simple "Have a great day" is prayer. And yes, sitting in silence and letting the Holy Spirit fill the room is prayer. Listening to that sermon, that worship song and reflecting on God's Word is also prayer. When we put this into perspective, praying without ceasing isn't so hard after all. It's not always about blocking time, although it's good to do so. Praying without

ceasing to me becomes this habit of intentionally being in communion with God. It takes discipline but when you think of it, we can't do life without Him (Acts 17:28), so the choice is clear!

Silence is uncomfortable for many of us. As humans, we like to fill the space, but there is something beautiful that happens when we give ourselves the grace to be vulnerable, bring our emptiness and let God fill the spaces. So today, come just as you are. Pull up a physical and/or spiritual chair, get closer and let God fill the spaces. He hears you even when you can't utter a word and trust me, it's okay and so sweet to hang out with Jesus and have absolutely nothing to say.

Next time you can't find the words, remember this:

Posture: Our heart posture has more to say than any words we can ever say.

Reverence: Honoring God for who He is and remembering His majesty does more to our hearts than any request we can make. Acceptance: If we acknowledge that God is all loving and all powerful, then we should trust Him enough to accept His plans, even when none of them make sense to us.

Yielding: When we accept His will for us, then it becomes a bit easier to yield to it; and as we yield to Him, His peace that surpasses all understanding (Philippians 4:7) fills our hearts.
