## What's in your hand?

It was 2016, and I was with the Messiah University Collaboratory/Village Water Ozonation System Team (VWOS) in Oaxaca, Mexico, helping to install a system that would enable the local people at Trigo Y Miel (wheat and honey) to have access to safe water.

As we were working, Pastor Victor Velasco came by and asked me why I was there helping the team install the system.

Through an interpreter, I told him my story. I explained that as I was retiring, I was wondering in what ways I could be useful and continue serving the Lord and people. I had retired from 50 years at the same job, working at a swimming pool company and dealing with water problems, filters, pumps, electrical issues, lots of plumbing etc.

I remembered the story in Exodus 4: 1-4, where the Lord said to Moses when he had doubts about his qualifications to do what he was asked to do. The question was "What is in Your Hand?" Moses had a staff in his hand that the Lord used to perform many marvelous miracles. So, I explained to Pastor VeJasco that I was there using the skills that were in my hand to serve the Lord.

In my hand I had different things – pipe wrenches, hacksaws, hammers, plus years of experience installing filter systems on all kinds of swimming pools and spas. After 50 years at this job, my body was pretty beat up but with replacement parts, new knees, rotator cuff repairs, back fusion and carpal tunnel repaired, I felt I had more to contribute to some phase of the Lord's work.

About this time, I was approached by Dr. David Vader and asked to help a team in the Collaboratory get an ozone system ready to be installed in Nicaragua the following year, 2014. I had experience with ozone

during my years using it as part of swimming pool sanitation.

We were able to get the system functional and with Ariela Vader's leadership successfully installed an ozone system at Villa es Esperanza, a home for girls in Managua, Nicaragua in 2014. (I had also gone with Ariela and her team to Honduras in 2008 to check out potential sites for ozone water purification.)

Then in 2015 another opportunity was presented in Oaxaca, Mexico and I went with a team to scout out the needs and discuss with the folks there what possible solutions we might provide. This led to the above referenced install at Trigo y Miel in 2016, now with Professor Michelle Lockwood leading the team. These systems continue to function well and provide good water for the compounds and surrounding communities.

In 2021, we again went to Oaxaca, Mexico, and installed another system for Pastor Felix to supply drinking water to his church and surrounding community. This time, because of COVID restrictions, no students were allowed to go out of the country. So,

our team consisted of me, Professor Lockwood and Hector and Yolanda Meija, Mexican nationals who had been Quality Greenhouse employees and great friends of Gary and Gloria Lebo.

We had another trip planned for Nicaragua in 2022, but it was canceled due to governmental issues and unrest on the island where the install was to happen. Since then, the equipment has been sent there and is waiting for a team to install it.



This year, we are scheduled to fly out March 3 to Kijabe, Africa to install a water purification system at a school there. This project will use chlorine as the oxidizer since the water is high in E.coli bacteria. Also, we plan to install a system at Hope Academy, a school in Guatemala near where Andi and Krishauna Brubaker are serving, in October.

Often at DBIC, we hear the Collaboratory included in the Sunday morning prayer time. Our team and activities are just a small window into the activities of the Collaboratory. Your prayers and support are appreciated as the students participate in these experiences that are life changing for many of the students.

It has been a blessing in my life to be able to use whatever talents and skills I may have as a means of ministry in my retirement years. I would encourage all who are facing retirement to consider service ministries that fit your gifts and interests. I heard someone say that during the working years one is doing what they are "paid to do," but after retiring they can do what they are "made to do."

Each of us needs to decide; What's in YOUR hand?

### Why do we use offering envelopes?

Using offering envelopes makes the job of the ushers and the financial secretary much easier, because it allows them to perform the legally required task of tracking your donations to the church more easily and accurately and helps to make sure you get one statement for your donations rather than multiple statements.

An additional benefit is that the system we use keeps the amount you give private. Dillsburg BIC uses a "blind offering envelope" system. What this means is that, if you choose to use offering envelopes, the ushers record your giving using the envelope number whenever they prepare a bank deposit and then the financial secretary compiles your giving for the year using that number. The financial secretary doesn't know who that number is assigned to, so he produces a statement of all the donations made using that envelope number and seals it in an envelope with the envelope number on the outside. Then, the administrative assistant, who knows which name goes with which envelope number, attaches a name label. It sounds a bit complicated, but the result is that no one in the church knows how much you give each year.

Since many people now donate using electronic means, a physical box of envelopes may not be needed. In that case, we can provide you with a giving number without any physical envelopes. Just contact Kathy in the office and request a giving number without envelopes. Then all you have to do is have your giving number noted on the check or electronic giving documentation, and if you want to put cash or a check in the offering plate, you can use a blank envelope with the number written on it.

### Join Jay Smith for a 'Museum of the Bible' Tour for

### Dillsburg BIC in Washington D.C. - March 25, 2023



Welcome to the Museum of the Bible tour in Washington DC; a tour which presents some extrabiblical corroboration for historic details found in the Old and New Testaments.

This tour is not designed to prove that the Bible is the 'Word of God'. Rather, it is designed to answer a much more basic question, "Is it true?" In order to answer that question, we will look at archaeological, documentary, and



manuscript evidence to support the historical veracity of the Bible in order to answer the challenge by many today that the Bible is simply made up of "myths and legends," and therefore cannot be trusted as a book of history. Today, however, we will only look at the artifacts, located on the fourth floor.

Some people may question the importance of this sort of an investigation. After all, the Bible never claims to be an historical book. Yet, the Bible does deal with historical material, such as peoples, places, events and periods of time. What we know is that:

- · People are found in history
- · Places exist in history
- · Events happen in history
- · All within specific periods of time





It is in these four areas that we can investigate it, corroborating the peoples, places, events and timeframes within the Bible and ascertain which are supported by extrabiblical evidence.

Why should we then employ a historical critique of the Bible?


Historical research uses original artifacts documents and manuscripts, which are neutral, so that the materials we look at are open for anyone to study and draw conclusions. Our intent in this tour is to show that when observing these artifacts, we find that the Bible describes history accurately (i.e. peoples, places, events, and time); in fact, in some cases,



better than other pieces of archaic literature. Once the Bible passes this historical test and is established as a credible source, we can then look at the other claims it makes and have greater confidence in its authority for those claims.

Any book which contends to be from God (i.e. the book of Mormons, the Bhagavad-Gita, the Upanishads, the Vedas, the Guru Granth Sahib, or the Qur'an), must first pass a similar historical test if they are going to be trusted by the sceptics.


