"Your Light Has Come" By Naomi Smith

Our Wednesday evening kids' program at DBIC is called "Shine," so each semester we choose a Bible verse to learn with the word "shine" in it. This fall we have been memorizing the first verse of Isaiah 60, where Isaiah says to the people of God: "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you." Emily Vader has been teaching the kids American Sign Language to accompany the verse, and as we move our hands and say the words together, I feel the joy that pulses through Isaiah's declaration.

Although this prophet lived more than 700 years before Christ, he knew what the glory of the Lord looked like, and he saw the light of Jesus beginning to break through the darkness. Isaiah stood in the stillness before the sunrise and eagerly pointed to the horizon, proclaiming:

> Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you.
> See, darkness covers the earth and thick darkness is over the peoples, but the Lord rises upon you and his glory appears over you.
> Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.

Here at the beginning of Advent, I am standing with Isaiah and looking for the light. Like the prophet, I see the way that "darkness covers the earth and thick darkness is over the peoples." In a year when wars have dominated headlines and destroyed lives, we rightly lament the thick darkness of evil. We cry out, "Come, Lord Jesus, and make all things well!" At the same time, we also cling to the truth that we have a God who brings light into the darkness. Even in our grief, we rejoice that our Lord Jesus came as a baby and lived as Emmanuel, our God with us, and died and rose again to make all things well.

Isaiah understood the power of light in darkness when he said to the weary, worn-torn people of God: "Arise, shine, for your light has come." The image here is of the people themselves glowing with the light of God's glory, reflecting God's goodness, beauty, and righteousness with such strength that "nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn." As the light of God inhabits his people, we become his lights in the darkness, pushing back against the evil in the world with a million pinpricks of hope, peace, joy, and love.

I am grateful that in our part of the world, we celebrate the birth of Jesus during the darkest month of the year. Throughout the long nights of December, we pay more attention to the way that light can overcome darkness. Even small amounts of light draw us in and keep us mesmerized. I love the way neighborhoods look with rows of houses adorned by strings of Christmas lights. I love the way my living room looks in the soft glow of the Christmas tree. And I love the way my children's faces look in the brightness of the candles winding around our Advent wreath.

Brothers and sisters, as the darkness grows around us this December, let us once again become bearers of God's light. Let's draw near to God and pray with courage and compassion. Let's sing the songs of Advent and Christmas with gusto and good cheer. Let's remember how God has been at work, both in the pages of Scripture and in our lives. Let's give generously to those in need. Let's say to one another, "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you!"

It is a comfortable, welcoming church family... I simply feel at home! And Pastor Rob's messages nurture my spirit in a fresh way.



As a Christian, I have always loved Jesus' parables. One of my favorite illustrations is at the end of the parable of the talents. In this parable, he challenges us to be good stewards of our resources and talents. He ends the parable by telling the audience that the king, representing God, rewards those who gave him something to eat when he was hungry, or something to drink when he was thirsty; those who visited him when he was sick and clothed him when he was naked. The statement seems puzzling. How can we feed God, or clothe him? Jesus ends the illustration with the answer from the king himself: "Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did it to one of these brothers of mine, even the least of them, you did it to me."

In other words, we show our love and thanksgiving to God, the giver of all good things, by giving to those in need, even to the least of them. Because when we bless the hurting, we're blessing the king.

Many of you reached out to us wanting to know how to pray over the current situation in the Middle East. If you're not sure where to start, here's a prayer from MCC Canada's Director of Advocacy and Public Policy, Anna Vogt:

Our hearts break for the people of Israel— For the victims of violent attacks by Hamas For those who live with fear and insecurity For those who suffer from the inter-generational trauma of violence.

We especially pray— That weapons of war be laid down That walls of separation be dismantled That prisoners be released That demonizing of "the other" cease That political leaders seek the good of all people in Palestine and Israel.

O God, whose heart breaks for the world, May your justice dwell in the land May your righteousness abide in fruitful fields May the effect of righteousness be quietness and trust forever May the effect of justice be peace—enduring peace.

For Unto Us a Child is Born

When I resort to an escape response [in dealing with conflict], I am generally focusing on "me." I am looking for what is easy, convenient, or non-threatening for myself. When I use an attack response, I am generally focusing on "you," blaming you and expecting you to give in and solve the problem. When I use a peacemaking response, my focus is on "us." I am aware of everyone's interests in the dispute, especially God's, and I am working toward mutual responsibility in solving a problem.

Food for Thought

The great pronouncement of the prophet Isaiah concerning the Messiah--" For unto *us* a child is born, unto *us* a son is given" (Is. 9:6a, emphasis ours)--takes on special meaning this time of year as we reflect on Ken's words, above.

By definition, Christmas can never be fully celebrated by "me" as a "personal family time with loved ones." If we celebrate in this way, we duck the piercing challenge of Christmas. We embrace the left side of the Slippery Slope and seek only that which is "easy, convenient, and non-threatening."

But Christmas is very threatening indeed. It is good news, but it is the kind of good news that cuts through "easy, convenient, and non-threatening" like a sword. Christmas is a stubbornly "us" celebration.

Just as Jesus redefined "neighbor" in the parable of the Good Samaritan, Christmas redefines "us" and insists that that definition--and the celebration of Christmas--must include those we'd rather not see around the tree on Christmas morning. In Jesus' Christmas celebration, our enemies are there--those who slander us and curse us and steal from us. Total strangers are there, for whom we now can and must care because God has cared for us. And even those who simply hurt our feelings unknowingly are there--those against whom we may presently be harboring tiny seeds of bitterness in our heart.

How and where will you celebrate Christmas this year? Will it be an "easy, convenient, and non-threatening" celebration spent entirely with loved ones? (One can almost hear Jesus' question in Matthew 5:47, "Do not even pagans do that?")

Or will your Christmas celebration take you to visit a home you'd rather not visit? Will it cause you to pick up the phone and dial a number you've long since quit dialing? Will it draw you outward to bring good news to a modern-day "shepherd" watching flocks by night (a convenience store clerk on Christmas eve, perhaps; or on-duty police officer or fire fighter)? Will it cause you to proclaim "good tidings of great joy for all the people"--to a stranger that you might otherwise pass without a word?

If so, then you will be swept up into the great prophecy recorded in Isaiah 9:7: "Of the increase of his government and *peace* there will be no end" (emphasis ours).
