" What Should I Say?" By Anne-Marie Brandt

As a writer and former journalist, I am acutely aware that choosing the right combination of words in a sentence is crucial. Isn't it funny how just one or two words can change the tone or the entire trajectory of a sentence or conversation?

For example, I recently reposted a meme on my Facebook page. It said, "Synonyms are weird because if you invite someone to your cottage in the forest, it sounds nice and cozy, but if I invite you to my cabin in the woods, then you're going to die." If anyone has been to our house on what I call "Brandt Mountain," then you would totally understand why I find this so amusing. (We live on 10+ acres of wooded land on top of a mountain, and have an extremely steep and rocky driveway. Needless to say, our house/cabin is totally secluded from the main road.)

Throughout the years, there have been numerous times when I've put my foot in my mouth by choosing the wrong word(s) when speaking with someone; whether it was with a stranger, friend, family member, or even a business colleague or client. For instance, when I was younger, I remember congratulating a former co-worker I hadn't seen in a while on her pregnancy, only to find out she wasn't pregnant at all. Instead, she had recently put on some weight and was wearing an unflattering top. Whew—talk about being mortified!

There are other times when I hold my tongue and don't say anything at all for fear of saying the wrong thing and hurting someone's feelings or offending them. What do you say in response when a friend shares that they have been diagnosed with a serious illness, experienced a tragedy or death in their family, or are losing their job? Situations like these are challenging to gauge what words of encouragement or sympathy should be given. Are the words "I'm sorry" or "that stinks" ever adequate or appropriate in these situations?

In the past, I've often caught myself saying the words "I'm sorry" in response to someone's bad news. By definition, the words "I'm sorry" are to be used as an apology towards a person you've wronged, not as words of sympathy or empathy. Lately, I've rephrased how I offer encouragement and sympathy by saying "I'm sorry you have to go through this" or "How can I travel this journey with you?" These phrases come more from my heart and feel more sincere, rather than full of pity or apology.

The Greek word for "encourage" is "parakaleo." It is used in the New Testament to describe not only giving comfort to someone but also involving exhortation, urging, strengthening, and even appealing. It is used in passages like 1 Thessalonians 5:11, "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing," and 2 Corinthians 1:3-4, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God." One of my love languages is "Words of Affirmation," which consists of encouraging, positive words and verbal or written acknowledgments of love and care. In the past, I've tried not to be stingy with words of encouragement, no matter how simple and brief. Within the past 10 years, I've become a huge fan of texting! I know many people do not like to text using their mobile phones, but I absolutely love to text! I have found that texting allows me to send short, encouraging messages to friends without interrupting them with a phone call. Granted, there are many situations where a phone call appropriate, but I've found that the majority of the time, a text allows the recipient the flexibility to respond when they are able to.

This month: I encourage you to send a card, a text message, or a simple email to five people who come to your mind after you read this article. Don't fret over having to come up with a long letter or flowery prose just jot down a sentence or two and send it. Even if your entire message consists of only "your name popped into my head and I just wanted to say 'hello'" - it's enough. I guarantee that the recipient of your communication will feel encouraged when they receive it.

Trust me, it's true!.

There is a lot happening at Peace Promise. First, I would like to update you on what is happening among the women we serve and those women who now partner in serving. Several of the women have asked for a Bible study specifically designed for trafficking survivors. Patty and Nikki, a survivor, will co-lead this study. How exciting and gratifying it is to see these women becoming leaders. Two other women have been asked to speak at the "For Love & Freedom Benefit" dinner this year. God is working through prayers and the wisdom he gives to those who reach out and walk beside them. I encourage those who are praying for Peace Promise to keep trusting God for the journey of trafficking survivors and those who are just starting on the way. It may be slow going, certainly not as fast as we would like, but I am convinced that His timing is perfect for each of the individual women He is drawing to His light. To date God has set 35 women free who were, and some who still are, connected with Peace Promise.

The benefit dinner mentioned above is scheduled for March 8th and will be held at Messiah University, Martin Commons. Details will follow in the bulletin and online at www.peacepromise.org. New Hope Ministry Musings

DBIC family,

Thank you, once again, for your generous contributions for New Hope Ministries for the Thanksgiving Baskets in November and the Christmas Blessings Express in December. Your participation blessed many families and individuals over those celebrations.

Following is just a bit of information that was gleaned off the New Hope website that I thought you might be interested in reading as it pertains specifically to the Brethren in Christ church here in Dillsburg. BRIEF HISTORY OF NEW HOPE MINISTRIES

January 1982 it was announced that because of government cuts to domestic programs, particularly to human services, Community Progress Council of York would be phasing out the programs of Dillsburg Dover Social Services, Incorporated (the only social service center in the area) by the end of the year. Concerns about the impact this would have on the community, particularly for those 430 families being served at a time of growing unemployment, prompted representatives from local churches to begin planning for an outreach ministry that would help fill the void when the government-funded center closed.

Generally, individual churches are not prepared to handle the task of emergency assistance alone, but by networking together with the community, churches can provide a center of service and emergency assistance, encouragement, and hope to those struggling with real survival needs.

New Hope Ministries was incorporated by the end of the year, 1982. The name "New Hope" had been selected to convey a message of hope and encouragement to those coming for assistance as well as to identify the ministry with the message of hope Christ holds out to all mankind.

On January 3, 1983, New Hope Ministries opened its doors in an approximately 15' x 25' space at the Dillsburg Brethren in Christ Church, with a food pantry of about 10' x 12' in a limestonewalled basement corner accessed only from the outside at the corner of East Harrisburg and South Chestnut Streets. ("Those guesstimated measurements cannot be verified today because of renovations that have taken place in those spaces.") That first month, with just one part-time but very committed staff person and many dedicated volunteers, New Hope was able to have its doors open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

New Hope Ministry records show that the first month of New Hope's operation (January 1983) 56 families were served. That number jumped to 80 in February. In just two months, New Hope Ministries had served 109 different family units, that number reflecting some family units served in both January and February. By the end of that first year the total number of families served was 239.

By April 1983, The Salvation Army approached New Hope Ministries, asking New Hope to administer their funds for the area. Later in the year, York Rescue Mission asked New Hope to distribute thirty-seven Thanksgiving baskets in New Hope's service area. In December, New Hope conducted its own Christmas dinner distribution of sixty-six boxes of food donations and wrapped gifts for children.

A year later, on January 7, 1984, New Hope Ministries filed a formal application with the United Way of York County to become a Partner Agency. On February 1, 1984, a United Way panel met with a group of New Hope staff, board members, and volunteers to review New Hope's application. On April 1, 1984, New Hope Ministries was formally approved as a United Way Partner Agency.

Did you know that the United Way of Adams County, United Way of the Capital Region and the United Way of York County provide low- to moderate-income working families with help completing federal and state tax returns? New Hope also serves as a meeting location. In fact in York County alone, New Hope Ministries provides 4 out of the 7 locations! For more details, visit your local United Way website.

As New Hope Ministries has grown, God has abundantly provided committed staff and volunteers and the needed resources, and after 35 years, we are still committed to sharing Christ's love by helping our neighbors in need, and currently provide services to close to 20,000 individuals from 8,400 families in York, Adams, and Cumberland Counties.

"There are so many people around you in need today, not just physically or financially, but emotionally and spiritually as well. Everyone you meet needs someone to encourage him or her. Will you make time to reach out and show them the awesome, unconditional, sacrificial love of Christ? Remember, God sees everything you do in His name and will bless you for all you do in obedience to Him (Hebrews 6:10).

Jesus, show me where I can serve others with Your love and compassion. Work through me to draw others to Yourself. Amen.

My hope is in Jesus because He is worthy of my service."
