# "A New Year..." By Pastor Rob Douglass

Depending on when you read this, a New Year is just around the corner or has begun. Did you make any New Year's resolutions?

Truth be told, for the last several decades, I have not made any New Year's resolutions. It seemed to me that they were an exercise in futility, a promise made to myself whose emptiness would be revealed in time, often in short order.

New Year's resolutions are an ancient human activity. The first record of them is about 4,000 years ago with the Babylonians. The beginning of the Babylonian year was around our March, as it marked the beginning of the planting season.

Throughout their history, New Year's resolutions have had a religious connection. For the Babylonians, the resolutions were promises to the gods that, if they were fulfilled, would result in the gods' granting their favor.

By the time of the Romans, the beginning of the year was moved. In 46 BC, Julius Caesar decided that the beginning of the year should be January 1, the month named after Janus, the god with two faces. One face looked backward into the past and the other was looking forward into the future.

January 1st was called the Kalends of January. Kalends is the word from which we get the world calendar. The Kalends of January involved all kinds of celebrations and religious rites, like public parades and sacrifices at various temples to diverse gods.

By the 300's AD, Christianity's impact on the Roman Empire was increasing. Yet, in spite of the Church's growing influence, the Kalends of January observances seemed to persist. In fact, when Emperor Julian attempted to re-establish paganism in the Empire in the 360's, he sought to revive the Kalends of January celebrations.

One early Church Father who likely had experienced Julian's celebration of the Kalends of January in 363 in Antioch was John Chrysostom. He was so disturbed by

what he witnessed that he preached a sermon about it. He likened the impact of the celebration of Kalends to enemies that have come against God's people at different times, such as the Amalekites in the Old Testament and the Barbarians in Chrysostom's day. He said,

"For the war is begun for us, not with the coming of the Amalekites, as then, nor with some other overrunning Barbarians, but with demons leading a procession in the forum. For the diabolical nightfestivities that occur today, the jests, the abuse, and the nocturnal dances, and this comedy, absurd and worse than every enemy, took our city captive."

Chrysostom was echoing Paul's central point in Ephesians 6. There is a war; our enemies are deadly serious; and our enemies are not other humans.

In light of the longstanding connection between New Year's resolutions and non-Christian religions, it may be surprising to read of my decision to break my habit and make a resolution this year.

I have resolved that in 2024 I want to be more like John Chrysostom. I want to commit myself to having my eyes open. I want to be more attentive to what God is doing, to see more clearly the needs of those around me, and to remember that "the war is begun for us" and that the enemy has taken "our city captive."

This year, may we all be more attentive. May our eyes be open to what he wants us to see, our hearts centered on Him and His Kingdom. May our hands ready to serve the Lord with strength he gives, and our feet ready to follow him through whatever we experience in 2024.

### A Peace Promise Story....

She reached out for help. A text message lit up Patty's phone. "I'm not okay. It's been a really hard week." Patty responded with a series of text messages that became in -depth conversations and several meet-ups for fun and relationship-building. From all external appearances, the young woman was doing exceptionally well. She had a good job and recently received a wage increase. She was accomplishing many of her personal goals. Yet, something unsettled her.

The work of healing never happens in a straight line, like a track and field athlete skillfully launching herself over a series of hurdles arriving at the finish line. Healing from trauma often looks like a salsa dancer's steps - forward, backward, side-to-side, and sometimes, spin. Salsa can be danced alone, but is better with a partner. Similarly, healing steps can begin with a singular focus to pursue sobriety or a desire for a life free from exploitation and violence. But healing happens in a community, with many dance partners, e.g., counselors, friends, survivors,

pastors, life skills instructors. Peace Promise is a healing community that seeks to support women on their way to wholeness. Support can look like a long text message thread, a ride to a doctor appointment, or a Christmas gift bag. Sometimes support spans years that includes: hospital stays, incarcerations, returns to violent partners, relapses, sobriety, court appearances, funerals, graduations, baby showers, infant adoptions, and weddings.

The young woman that reached out to Patty for support needed a calming presence, a temporary change in her living arrangement, and caring adults to listen and respond to her concerns. Several people in the Peace Promise community came alongside her, and continue to offer encouragement. Thank you, donors, for your ongoing participation in Peace Promise's healing community. Your prayers and financial gifts provide the foundation for healing.



# In the Pew Next To YOU: Meet: Connie & Al Darbrow

### Born and Raised in...

Connie: I was born and raised in Dillsburg. I was actually born at home, in the old house behind the Drive-In. I was a Farmer's Fair baby, born on a Friday night of the "Baby Parade" and on a Friday auction night. My mom was at the parade when I started to come into this world. Dr. Miller from Dillsburg was at the auction that night when my grandfather asked if anyone was there that could deliver a baby. He did not know what was going to happen. I started to come foot first. If it hadn't been for Dr. Miller, neither me nor my mother would have lived to tell the story.

Al: Al was born in Lewisberry and raised in Mechanicsburg. He was the delivery boy for the Grit newspaper and got to know lots of people in town. He also worked on a local farm, helping to milk the cows and do any other chores he could before he went to school and after. During his ninth year, he quit school to help bring in money for the family due to his dad having both legs broken at work. He later became a truck driver and did so for 43 years.

A bit about our family...

Connie: I have one sister and three children (two daughters and one son), five grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren.

Al: Al has one brother and two sisters. He also has three children (two daughters and one son), seven grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren.

### We spend our days doing...

Connie: Most of my days are at the auction taking calls, setting up drop-off appointments, taking pictures, and loading them on the website. I also help unload the trucks, order supplies for the restaurant, and in the summer, load the movies onto the projector. Weekend evenings are spent at the ticket gate to the movies.

Al: Al spends summer days mowing at Haars and doing any repairs he can. He also enjoys fixing things in his workshop. He loves to restore old tractors! He also enjoys sitting in his recliner in the shop.

### How I became a Christian...

Connie: I was at a low time in my life during my 1st marriage when I confided in a friend at Highmark Blue Shield. She comforted me and led me in the prayer of my salvation.

Al: Al was going to a Christian Missionary Alliance Church at age 12 when Mrs. Butler from the church led him in the prayer of salvation. Later in his 40s, he had pneumonia, was listening to a TV evangelist, and reaffirmed his salvation.

## Times we really saw God work in our lives were...

Connie: I had three instances. My daughter Lori (Mitchel's Mom) had a problem with her first pregnancy. She was at Allentown Neonatal Ward and needed to stay in bed until she delivered.



During the night I had a dream that I was actually talking to the baby, telling him not to come yet. I was awoken by a phone call to get to the hospital because my daughter Lori was going into labor. Baby David was born but only lived for two hours. God allowed me to be with my daughter to comfort her and to see and hold that dear little boy.

Another instance was when my first husband was abusing me, slamming my head into the refrigerator. I called to God, saying, "Please let his work call and take him away from me." The phone rang and he left.

The third instance was when Al was in the hospital with bleeds that they could not reach, and he was really doing badly. I prayed so hard for his healing to stop the bleeding, and I feel that this was an answered prayer, a miracle. The bleeding stopped!

Al: God has worked so many times in his life with getting him through many operations: Hernia, quad bypass, aortic valve replaced (which meant he had to be cut open again). Four years later, the same valve needed to be replaced but they were able to go through the groin. Four years later, the same valve needed to be replaced but this meant the third time for open heart surgery. His last bout was the bleeds in his stomach. God's healing power got him through! Praise God

### Update from CF, a Cross-Cultural Missionary

CF will be sharing with the youth Sunday school class and bringing greetings to our congregation on January 21. Here is an introduction to her experiences in cross-cultural ministry thus far:

I am a nurse from Central PA who is part of Cedar Grove BIC Church in Mifflintown, PA. From the time that I was 13, I knew that I wanted to work with people overseas. After a lot of prayer and discernment, I moved to Dearborn, MI in August 2019 with BICWM as a 'Kingdom Professional.' Dearborn has the largest concentration of Arabs outside of the Middle East. There, I lived, worked, and ministered among Arab people. In my house, I had an Omani university student and a Syrian refugee as housemates. Around me, my neighbors were Lebanese, Yemenis, Iraqi, and Jordanian. I assisted with a tutoring program that allowed me to grow really close to one particular Syrian family. I was also actively part of a bilingual gathering where we did praise music, prayed, and Bible storytold in both languages.

In addition to my neighborhood involvement, I was also able to start teaching nursing students at a local university and went on to earn my Master's degree in Nursing Education. Teaching nursing students is such a natural pathway of discipleship.

After a trip to the Arabian Peninsula in 2022, I realized that I still wanted to go overseas and began to make plans for a move to that region. Because my life in Dearborn was chaotic, after finishing my master's degree, I took 5 months off to be in Germany with family and take some time to slow down, pray, and listen. (My mom is originally from Germany, and I have dual citizenship.) Some of my original plans shifted a little while I was there, but I am still planning to go to that region (just a different country than I originally thought).
