I Have Come Home

When my husband Jason and I were in college and newly dating, we took a class together on the writings of the Oxford Christians—a group of authors based in Oxford, England that included such notable names as J.R.R. Tolkien and C.S. Lewis. A lesser-known author of that group was a woman named Dorothy L. Sayers, a novelist and playwright whose series of mystery books featuring Lord Peter Wimsey became her most popular works. During the class we read one of Sayers' novels called Busman's Honeymoon, and a year and a half later, as Jason knelt in the snowy woods to propose marriage, he invited me to read a quote from that book, in which Lord Peter says:

"And what do all the great words come to in the end, but that? I love you. I am at rest with you. I have come home."

One Christmas, I decided to paint the words "I have come home" on a small circle of wood as a gift for Jason. A few years later, he had an inspired idea: to hang that circle of wood on a string in the garage, at the exact spot that lets him know how far to pull his car into the bay. Now every time his vehicle comes to a stop in our garage, the wood gently clicks against the windshield to declare: "I have come home."

Throughout the Biblical narrative, the idea of God being at home with his people, and they with him, pulses like the heartbeat of the story. The children of God face exile because of sin, and they wander, and they struggle to carve out a home, and then when they get so comfortable in that earthly home that they forget that God is their home, they face exile once again. So God in human form comes to dwell with his children, to live and die and be raised to life so that they can at last be at home with him.

The gospel of John tells us that early on Easter morning, a woman named Mary Magdalene wept in the garden outside the tomb of Jesus. She had come to anoint the body of her rabbi but found that even that fragile connection had been severed. Mary was in exile, separated from the one who rescued her from the kingdom of darkness and gave her a home in the kingdom of light. Then from across the void, Jesus appeared with a question for Mary: "Who are you looking for?" Thinking Jesus was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Then Jesus said simply, "Mary."

At the sound of her name, Mary's confusion and despair melted into surprise and wonder. She turned toward Jesus and cried out "Rabboni!" Yet as she reached for him, Jesus said, "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.""

Like Mary, I would have wanted to hold tight to Jesus—this is what we do when lost things are found. When Mary encountered Jesus in the garden, however, his mission was not yet complete. He stood there as the triumphant messianic king, but he had not yet been crowned king. With his death and resurrection, Jesus defeated the forces of evil, but until he ascended to take his rightful place on the heavenly throne at the right hand of God the Father, his reign had not yet begun.

Even now, nearly two thousand years after Jesus rose to life and ascended, we live in the tension of the already-but-not-yet. Jesus is reigning, and his Spirit has been poured out, and hearts all around the world continue to turn toward him. But we still weep with Mary at the separation of death and the evil that seems to run rampant in the world. We long for the day when Jesus will return to bring heaven and earth together.

Until then, we look for signposts along the way. As we journey here, by God's grace we find people and places where we can say, "I am at rest with you. I have come home." As we love and are loved, we discover in the beauty and brokenness of human relationships our own longings met and unmet. Then we turn together to Jesus our king and invite him to lead us on, further up and further into the home we have in him.

The "Whys" of Thrift on Purpose: A Mennonite Central Committee Thrift Shop

At Thrift on Purpose, every purchase is a gift to the world!

Since children from Shine are putting together school kits and sending them to MCC, I decided to focus this month's "Whys" of Thrift on Purpose on how your purchase allows MCC to assist in education by giving out school kits.

What are school kits? School kits are new school supplies that are "distributed in a useful double-drawstring cloth bag." (MCC.org) Contents of the bags are: 4 spiral notebooks, 8 unsharpened pencils, 1 ruler, 12 colored pencils, 1 large eraser, 4 black or blue ballpoint pens, and 1 all-metal pencil sharpener.

How are things in Africa?

This is a question we hear often these days especially with the president's executive order to hold USAID for a period of 90 days. Shortly thereafter Zambia received a waiver for medically necessary support. The republic of Zambia has worked hard to have a sustainable model of governance under the Minister of Health and partners with religious and other non-governmental organizations. Zambia has made it a priority to make sure these funds are used appropriately. Therefore, our stock of medications for HIV treatment remains



intact and patients continue to receive the care they need, but there is some uncertainty about what is next.

I am pleased to say that we continue to have good rains. We should see a good harvest in the next couple of months. The church and hospital have partnered together to help this past year during the time of drought. Through donations from the BIC Global Compassion Fund and other individuals, we have given out 26 hundred 25kg bags of roller meal so far and plan to continue this through the end of March or when the harvest is secured.





Other projects from last year are wrapping up nicely. We have completed our female ward renovations and the patients will move back in this week. The labor suite has been refurbished and is back in use. We have received a grant through the World Bank and a large donation from Messiah University to build a new neonatal intensive care unit, which should begin later this year.

I'd be remiss if I didn't mention the huge upgrade to the water system last fall. For the first time ever our 80,000 liter tank has been full and running over with clean drinking water, providing water to the hospital and compound 24 hours a day.

We are so thankful to the many individuals who have given generously to make all these programs happen. Through your generous support we have weathered a famine worse than 2019 but with less hunger and despair. We have been blessed to share your love in a tangible way to those here in need.

STOP TRAFFIC

Friday's fundraising event, For Love and Freedom, supporting the women served by Peace Promise, was a great success. With over 350 guests—the largest turnout we've ever had—we are grateful for the overwhelming support. It is our hope that God was glorified and that attendees left inspired by the program. We also hope this event will encourage more volunteers, donors, and partners to join Peace Promise in its mission. Additionally, we trust that our guests gained a clearer understanding of how Peace Promise serves women trapped in the sex industry as they journey toward freedom.

Some of our friends at DBIC attended the event. When I asked one of them, Rosie Stoner, about her experience, she shared the following observations. She was especially moved by the story of a truck stop owner who is part of *Truckers Against Trafficking*. He noticed a young woman in his truck stop who appeared to be hiding in the restroom. Recognizing the signs of trafficking, he stepped in to rescue her from her trafficker. He then paid for her bus fare to Harrisburg, where she met with Patty Seaman, Director of Client Services at Peace Promise. Today, that young woman is taking leadership classes to help other survivors of trafficking.

Rosie was also deeply impacted by hearing from four of the women who were interviewed at the event. She expressed how meaningful it was to see the very women she prays for. These women are currently receiving



counseling and participating in the Economic Empowerment Program, which equips them with the skills needed to support themselves and their families. Through this program, they receive job training in safe environments, such as *Good Ground Coffee Shop* and *Soaps by Survivors*, where they earn a salary while developing essential workplace skills.

Another aspect that stood out to Rosie was Peace Promise's commitment not only to the women but also to their children. The organization fosters a sense of community, where the women support, encourage, and uplift one another.

Rosie found the event to be a powerful and meaningful way to learn about the mission and impact of Peace Promise.
