All in One Day

It was a very hot day in February, 1982. The sun rose boldly and poured brightness on the coal mining town of Hwange, Zimbabwe, where Fred and I were to assist in the growth of the small church already started by Maria Tshuma. She had gathered some Brethren in Christ members who moved there for work.

We did not feel so much brightness in our hearts that morning. We had come back to Zimbabwe, the first missionaries to return after independence was achieved, with a desire to train urban church planters. There was some difficulty in agreeing on a place for us to work, but finally we had been sent to Hwange where we were staying in the small house of a mine worker on vacation. Hwange was at low altitude and was known for its heat. We had hoped that the worst would be over by February, but we were wrong. It was almost 100 degrees each day and we were struggling.

Furthermore, although we had laid various kinds of groundwork, now that we thought all was ready, we were stuck. The leaders of the church planting had just informed us that they could not take the training or help with visitation that week because they were teachers and were busy with the opening of school.

Besides this, even if people had been able to work with us, we had no way to get to the targeted area because the effects of the war were still in evidence and the town was literally out of gas. There was no "petrol" to be found anywhere and our tank was on empty.

The church appeared to be at a standstill because they were worshipping in a very old assembly hall and people were not attracted to the services. Church members had tried to get the managers of the mine, which literally owned the land on which the town was built, to grant a plot of land for a church. These men had even been known to donate used building materials for construction at times, but so far the contacts had been very discouraging and the people had quit trying.

With doors closed every way we turned, Fred and I sat and looked at each other that morning feeling there was not a thing in the world we could do. We prayed and thought and


perspired. Since we could not do training or visitation, we had arranged for a couple of older people to come later that morning to visit the mine authorities with Fred and ask once more about a site to build a church.

Eventually they came, and the little delegation walked to the mine office. To their surprise the official they talked to picked up a phone, talked to someone under him and directed that the Brethren in Christ immediately be given a plot on a certain street in Section A of the compound. He then picked up another phone and directed a different supervisor to have the bricks from the demolition of a certain building delivered to this plot for the building of the new church.

The church delegation looked at each other in amazement, thanked the officer, and left the building laughing and talking. Back at the house where Maria Tshuma came to share the good news with me, she and I agreed that we would walk several miles to the police compound where the local policemen and their families lived. We would ask permission to visit and invite people to church. We trusted that the Lord would not let us expire in the fierce midday heat. The Chief of Police smiled broadly as we spoke to him.

"Does Mr. Holland still drive his motorcycle fast?" he asked. Puzzled, we asked how he knew Fred.

"Oh, I was a student at Wanezi Mission when you were there 15 years ago," he answered. "I used to love watching him

While we were gone, Fred looked up the street and saw the petrol truck unloading fuel at one of the stations. He ran and got the car, drove to the station and was allotted five liters (something over a gallon) of gas. He quickly drove to another station with the same result. A visit back to the first station this time yielded another ten liters—altogether about five gallons. Now we had some gas to get around. We could hardly believe how things had turned out that day.

Later that evening when we had time to put two and two together and turned to thank God, we saw that we had been the subject of prayer in the Mission Prayer Challenge that day. We would not doubt again that God answers prayer. We had gas, a church site, free bricks, and help in an open place for visitation. This was going to be a fruitful experience.

The "Whys" of Thrift on Purpose: A Mennonite Central Committee Thrift Shop

At Thrift on Purpose, every purchase is a gift to the world!

Here is how your purchase allows MCC to work with partners in development:

Ntombizodwa Mapfacha stirs a pot of beans as she cooks on her fuel-efficient stove. The fire was just lit. The flames will soon subside, leaving the heat of the fire focused on the pot. With the fire contained, the stove cooks more efficiently and requires less firewood. (MCC.org)

"The fuel-efficient stove in Ntombizodwa Mapfacha's dirt courtyard in Mwenezi District, Zimbabwe, doesn't look like a life-changing piece of technology. It looks like a 2-foot high, round metal can.

Nevertheless, this sturdy stove not only cooks a traditional, family-size meal of sadza (thick cornmeal) and beans. It also is empowering Mapfacha and other women in Mwenezi District.

No longer does Mapfacha have to walk six miles every other day to find firewood in the mountain, where she is wary of poisonous snakes and men who could take advantage of her in the remote area. The new stove cooks with just a few pieces of wood and dried corn cobs, which she can gather close to home.

No longer does she need to stay by an open fire, her lungs and eyes burning from smoke, tending and feeding it for the two to three hours it takes to cook a meal.

She only needs to peek into the stove periodically to make sure the fire's direct heat is keeping the beans simmering in the pot. And the stove is portable, giving her freedom and time to pursue work that generates income for her family. She grinds groundnuts into nut butter to sell and collects fruit to sell or eat. And she spends more time working with her husband in the field, increasing the amount of produce they sell.

In 2021, MCC's partner, Score Against Poverty (SCORE), introduced a clean energy pilot project designed to empower women while addressing climate change. The project provided 50 fuel-efficient stoves to women." (MCC.org; Linda Espenshade; December 28, 2022)

Letter from Don Pratt

Don Pratt is a retired Messiah University engineering professor at who once attended DBIC and is now part of New Life Community. He has been part of a team working on a device to find, deactivate and destroy land mines and other unexploded ordinances, thousands of which are left over from past wars. He and his wife Kathy recently travelled to Cambodia for a field demonstration of this device. Below is a report of their efforts. We rejoice that a BIC engineer is able to contribute to helping many people around the world stay safe from after effects of war.

"Our first day at the range was challenging - the equipment kept shutting down after only 20 seconds because of the heat, which wasn't long enough to fully destroy some of the targets.

But we were praying (and we know many of you were too!) and God gave Don some ideas to try. We hadn't brought a lot of extra parts, but that night we were able to modify the electronics in the main control box to better handle the heat.

The second day at the range was quite an improvement - the HTL worked beautifully! They have CCTV at the range and it was very cool to be able to set up everything at the target, arm the system, then return to the bunker where we could watch what was happening on a computer screen.

Turning the key on the remote starts the process: a small flame as the HTL ignites, followed by a shower of sparks as it penetrates the steel case, then lots of flames as it pushes fire into the hole. The idea is to quickly burn a hole through the wall of the munition (which can be over an inch of solid steel) then burn up the trigger mechanism (so the thing can't go off), followed by a controlled burn of the explosive.

We've done many tests on pieces of steel in the backyard at our home in PA, but this was the first time trying it on actual live targets and it was deeply gratifying to see it take something so dangerous and render it completely harmless. We were able to destroy mortars, artillery rounds, rocket grenades, and even a huge anti-vehicle mine - pretty exciting!"

the painful emotions and relational challenges with a goal of restoration. As we continue that journey of relational healing, we ask that you continue to uplift our survivors.. Your prayers are felt on a daily basis.

This month, we have also started our journey through the book Keep Your Love On by Danny Silk to begin looking at healthy communication, building connections and setting boundaries.

We have also celebrated two of our survivors being released from parole. One of those survivors was granted early release, 2 years ahead of time. Congratulations on the hard work.


