What's Your Story" By Carolyn Kimmel

Editor's Note: I'm delighted to share this Doulos article, originally published in the December 2016 edition, written by our beloved Carolyn Kimmel. Carolyn's thoughtful insights and heartfelt words continue to inspire and resonate with our community, making this piece just as meaningful today as it was when first shared.

Home is where your story begins.

That's written on the frame of a mirror that hangs near our doorway. Maybe it's because I love writing stories, but that sentence strikes a chord with me. It's my hope that when anyone in our house glances in that mirror before they leave for the day, they remember that love and grace undergird the home from which they set out.

Because what we experience in our childhood home certainly does impact at least the lead of the story that starts the day we are born. We – and the events that shape our lives – add in much of the narrative along the way, but the start of the story remains.

I am indescribably grateful that my three daughters have reached young adulthood with no tragedy that might color the best that they expect from life — and from God — when they put forth their best effort.

I was thinking about this recently when, in our Pre-K Sunday school class, we were talking about flowers. The children were telling us all the reasons they love flowers . . . they are pretty to look at; they smell good; it makes us happy when someone sends us flowers.

And, although I kept my thoughts silent, it suddenly hit me how much I don't like flowers. And I absolutely don't like how they smell. And the sight of them makes me feel . . . melancholy and momentarily lost.

Because that's where my story started . . . at least the earliest part I can remember. When my mother was sick, people sent her flowers to cheer her up. When she was in the hospital, more flowers were delivered. She

passed away when I was in elementary school – and oh the flowers we received! At the house, at the funeral home. The smell assailed my senses when I entered that alcove where she lay in her casket. It was foreign and scary and sad. I felt lost. And all I could smell were the flowers. Three years later, when my beloved grandma – my mother substitute – died suddenly, bringing more loss – and more flowers.

So now, many years later, the smell of flowers takes me back . . . back to where my story began.

This month we celebrate the One whose story began in a stable, where he was born as a baby destined to take on the sins of mankind. Growing up with a dad who was a carpenter, no doubt the smell of sawdust and the sight of wood chips were familiar to Jesus. I imagine him sitting in a shop with his dad, bonding over a piece of wood he was fashioning with his carpenter's plane.

And I wonder, did he think of that wood when he carried another piece of wood – the cross – on his back as he trod the streets of Jerusalem toward his death? Did the feel of it in his hands this time bring any comfort from the memory of home – or only pain and keen awareness of betrayal? He knew his story would end in triumph, but it far from an easy road.

There was a time, I must admit, when I wasn't sure I trusted the Author who was writing my story. If the beginning were any indication, I thought I might certainly have to take over the pen. While we all know where our stories started, we often wonder what the middle part will look like – what dangling participles will

leave us hanging and uncertain; what exclamation points will fill our days with excitement; what periods will end sentences when we had much more to say? And the temptation is there to write our own stories, foolishly thinking we can write the happy ending that at times seems so elusive.

The good news of the Christmas story is we know the ending – and it's for us! It's a story that's become so familiar that sometimes we fail to appreciate its awe. But if we take time to really think about the story – the unlikely excuse that Mary gave when she turned up pregnant as a virgin - "It's God's son" - the crude surroundings where Jesus was born; the lowly shepherds that the angels entrusted to proclaim the news of his birth; the coming of the One who would die so we might live . . . wow; that's some story! And it's true!

For Christians, home – our eternal home - is where our story also ends. Thank you, Lord, for that precious gift!

Sometimes I can get bitter, if I let myself, about all the things in my life that were tainted for me because they became stained by early loss. Maybe there are those things for you as well.

But the beauty of the Christmas story for me is this: Jesus overcomes any twist in our earthly stories of home that seem too hard to smooth over. Because He lives, I can smell flowers anew and know that my story is safe in his hands – and I can trust his edits will bring me back home forever.

The "Whys" of Thrift on Purpose: A Mennonite Central Committee Thrift Shop

Here is how your purchase allows MCC to work with partners in development:

A Novel Approach to Peacebuilding: MCC-supported peace libraries help Rwandan youth foster a harmonious new chapter.

It is morning in Rwanda's Gicumbi District, Northern Province. Rays of sun stream through the windows of the Gicumbi Children's Peace Library, softly illuminating shelves stocked with colorful Bible stories, crossword anthologies and books on the environment. A plethora of works by African authors shares shelf space with titles like Clifford the Big Red Dog.

Children from G.S. Byumba Inyange, a local school, walk to the library with their teacher and sit in a row. Francine Muhawenimana, a coordinator at the library, hands them each a slip of paper with a single word written on it, in English, which the children study alongside the national language of Kinyarwanda.

As Muhawenimana asks the students to take turns using their words in sentences, Bruno Ineza Kabera is the first to raise his hand, crafting a sentence with the word "sister." His peers share sentences using words like "brother," "pot" and "friends." When a child is unsure of what their word means, the others assist.

Muhawenimana next projects the pages of a picture book — Beloved Daughter by Uganda-based teacher and author Ritah Katetemera — onto a screen at the front of the room. The book is part of African Storybook, an initiative that publishes children's books by African authors in a range of languages spoken on the continent. She reads each page in both English and Kinyarwanda. The story, about a young girl who is comforted by a friend after her brothers break her favorite clay pot, features all the words used in the first activity. When the book ends, Muhawenimana leads the children in a short discussion about ways they can help their friends. "It helped me to refresh my mind," says Ineza Kabera, and to learn the meaning of new words. But this and other activities also help children learn the value of peace — and how to foster it in their communities.

In the years after the 1994 genocide against the Tutsi — which turned neighbors against neighbors, friends against friends, and in which moderate Hutus were also killed — Rwandan and international organizations started various peacebuilding initiatives. They worked to repair

deepened. These programs generally focused on reaching Rwandan adults.

But, as Muhawenimana explains, "Even the children, they have conflict between them," which can lead to arguments, theft and even physical altercations in schools. The organization she works for, MCC partner Transformational Leadership Center (TLC), saw

the rift between ethnic groups that decades of colonial rule had

Seeking to instill a culture of peace and a lifelong love of reading in children, TLC opened its first peace library in 2005. Today, the organization runs six libraries across Rwanda. In addition to activities like these, children partake in peace debates. They are presented with a topic, and with a stance to take on it. They research the topic using library resources, and then practice public speaking skills when they state their case to their peers. About 250 children and teens have also completed peer mediation training at the libraries.

"In peer mediation, we study how children can help another child or her friend or her family," explains Ineza Kabera's classmate Sonia Hakizimana Iraboneye. During the trainings, youth aged 8 to 15 learn about the root causes of conflict and practice mediation techniques by acting out scenarios, such as intervening when one classmate steals another's pen. When a similar situation played out in real life at school, Bienvenue Mugisha knew exactly what to do. He compelled a classmate to return items they'd stolen from a friend — and convinced the student they'd stolen from to forgive the theft.

Elevator doors slid open. The courthouse hallway was empty with the exception of residual emotions - anxiety, anger, sadness, grief - remained. Tension was palpable. The elevator doors emitted pairs and small groups of people. Each person emerged from the elevator wearing their best court clothes - dress pants, suit jackets rumpled from riding in the car, flowing pantsuits, shoes that shined and pinched. Then the doors parted and she stepped across the threshold attired in a sapphire blue pantsuit with coordinating white blouse and heeled sandals. Her slender hands, punctuated by sparkling fingernails, gripped a file-organizer: Filled with proof of her goodness - letters of recommendation, certificates of completion, clean urine tests, and handwritten letters to her son. She walked confidently down the hallway and entered the courtroom surrounded by her support team.

The purpose of the hearing was to assess parental change and competence. No one expected the judge, familiar with this case from its inception, to call his own witness to the stand. He invited her forward. She raised her trembling right hand, repeated the oath, and took her seat nervously beside the judge; the same man who previously sentenced her to incarceration. Today, compassionate strength flooded his eyes. He opened with a statement, followed by a question. "All of us are just one decision away from losing it all. What will prevent you from making that kind of decision - decisions like the ones you made in the past?" Her, reply was quick and forthright, "My faith. My family. Those people sitting back there help me when I'm having a rough day." After more conversation and public affirmation of her remarkable accomplishments and transformation, the judge awarded visitation.

Astonishment. Gratitude. Awe. Two weeks later a son sprinted across a room into the open arms of his mother. Thank you, donors, for your gifts of prayer and financial support. 
